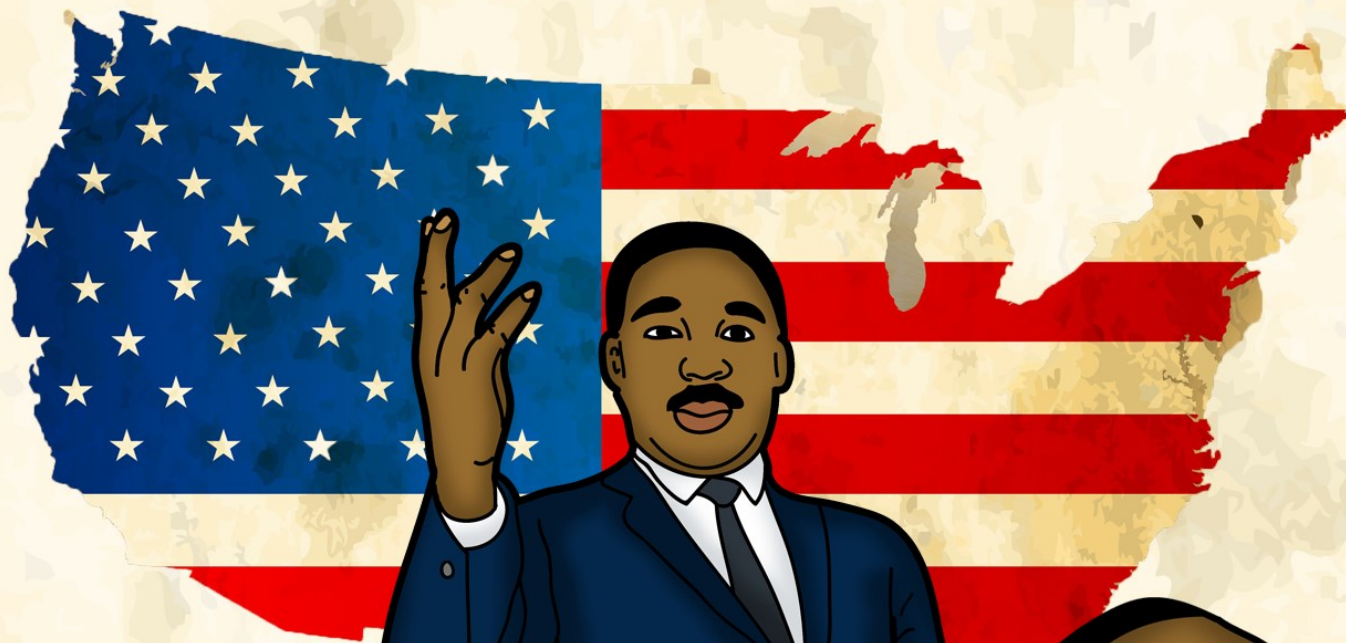

a Baptist minister.



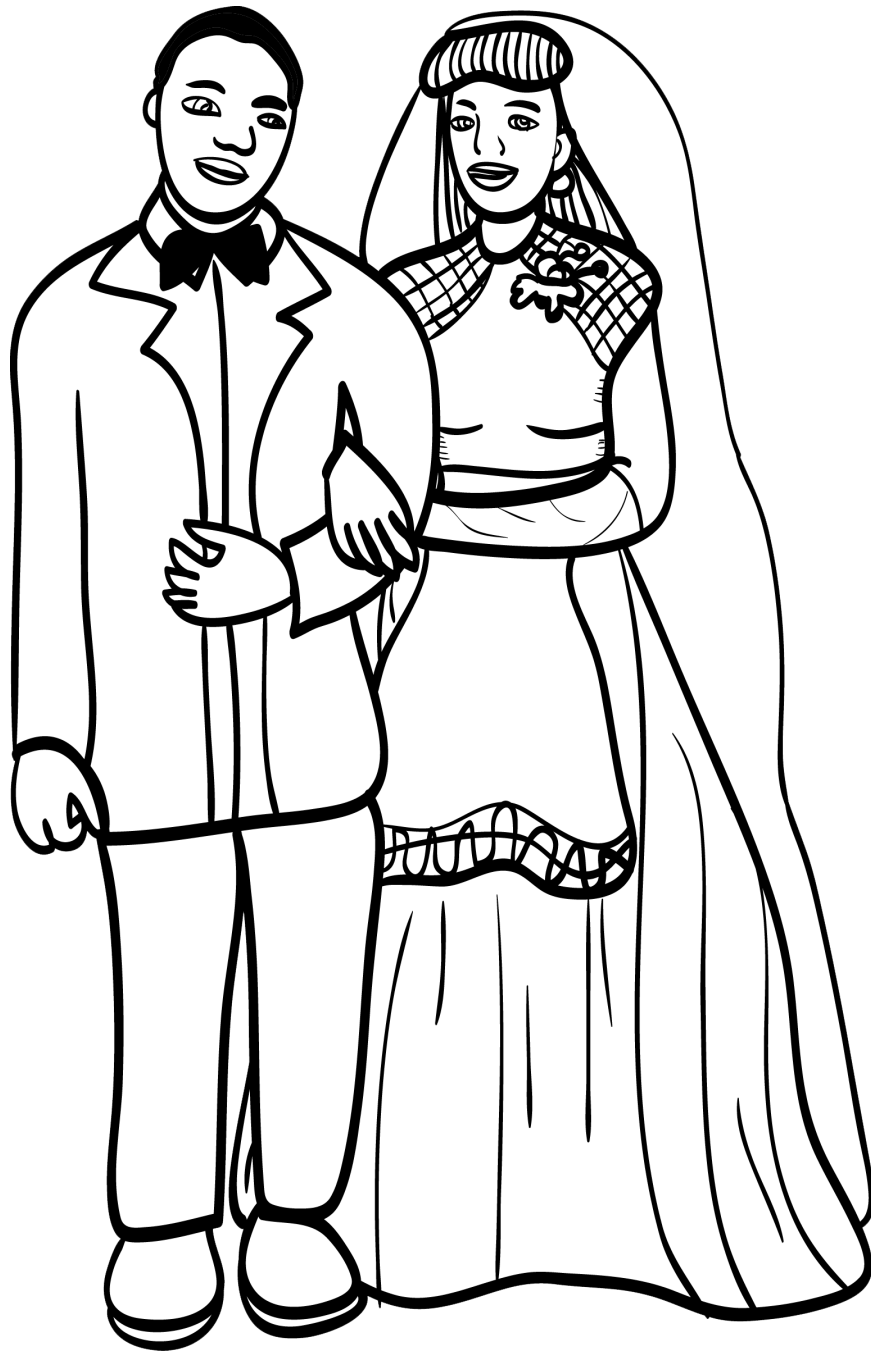
He attended

Seminary, and

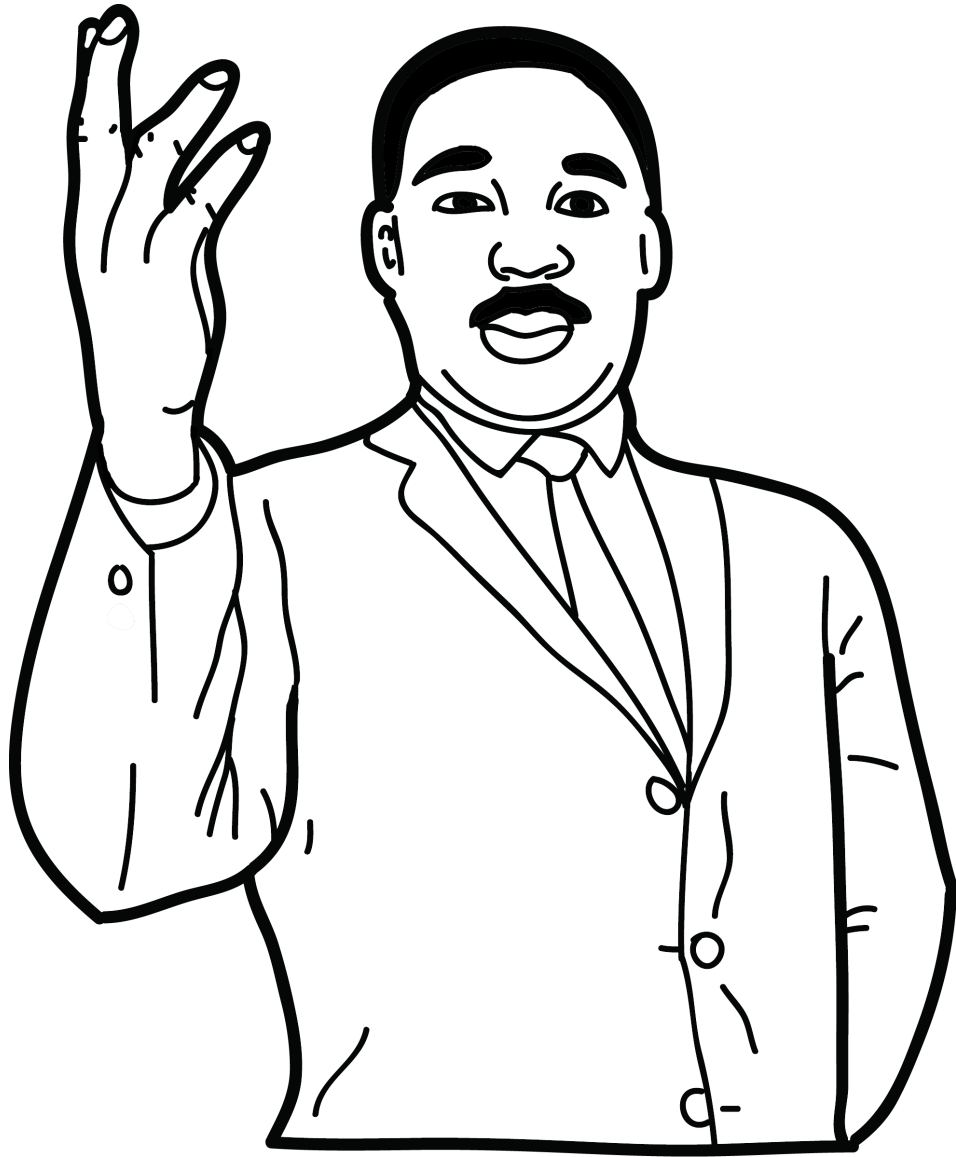
Boston University.

Scott in Boston, and

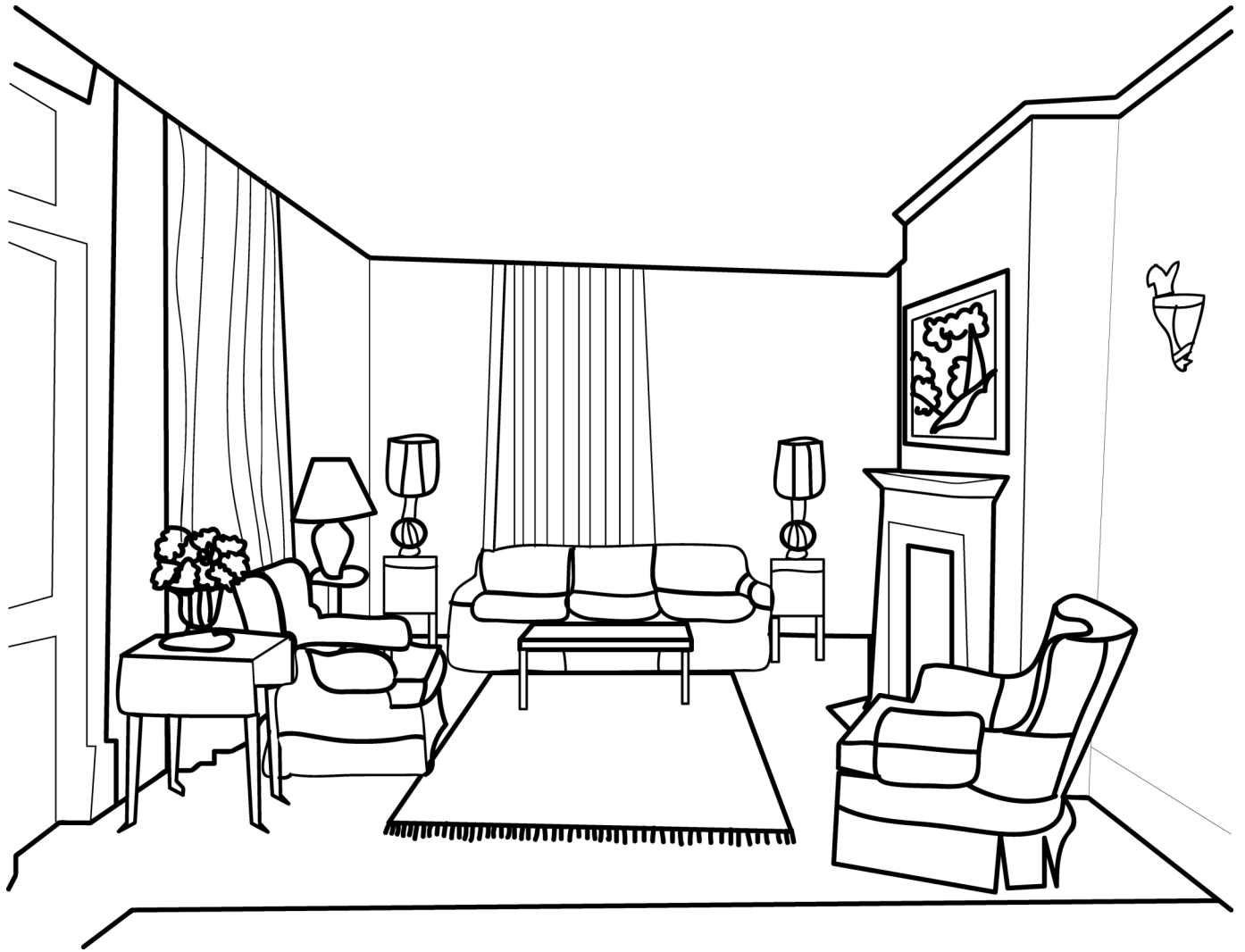
they later married.

Montgomery, AL.



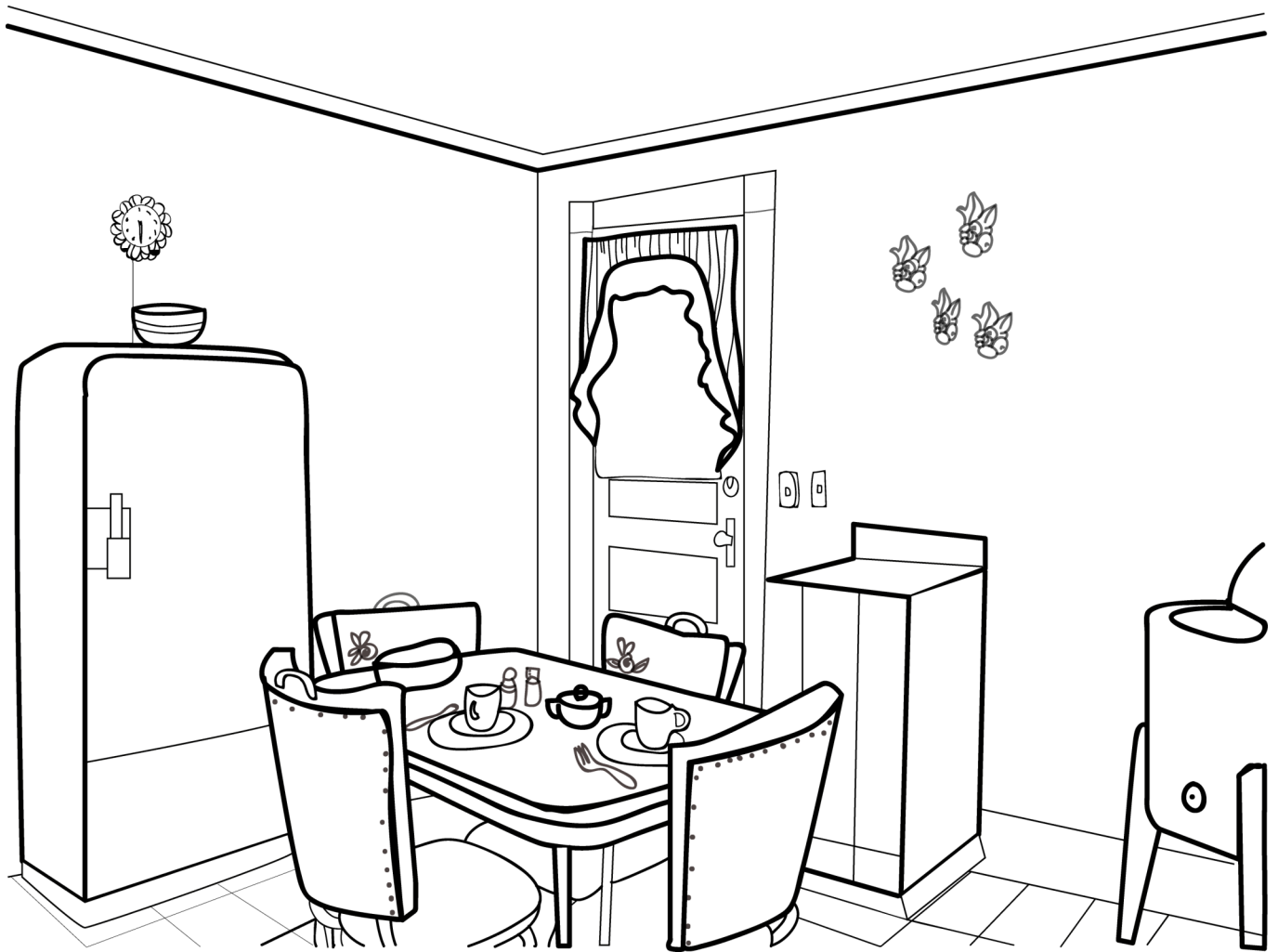
In Montgomery, his

room, . . .



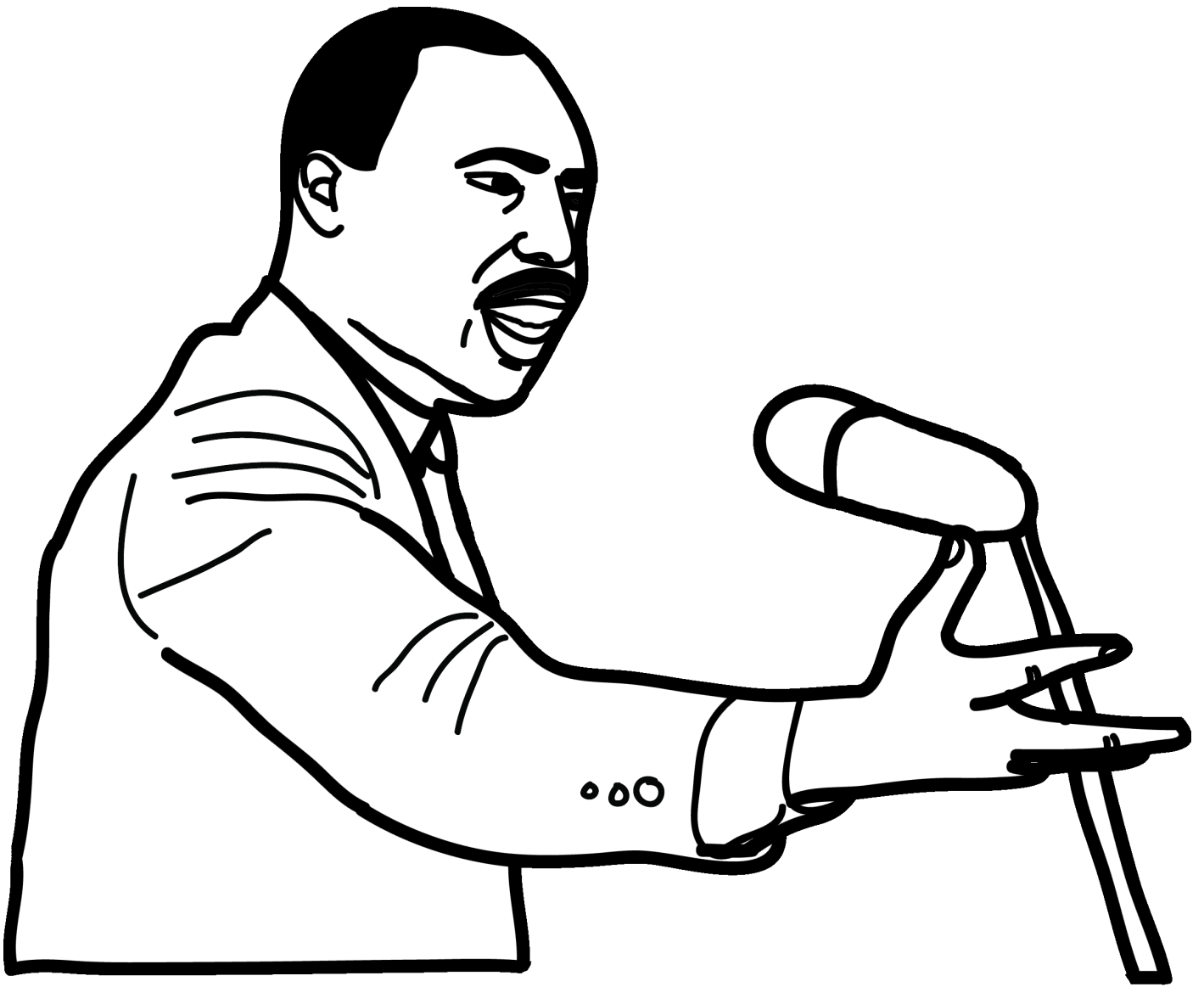
and a bedroom.



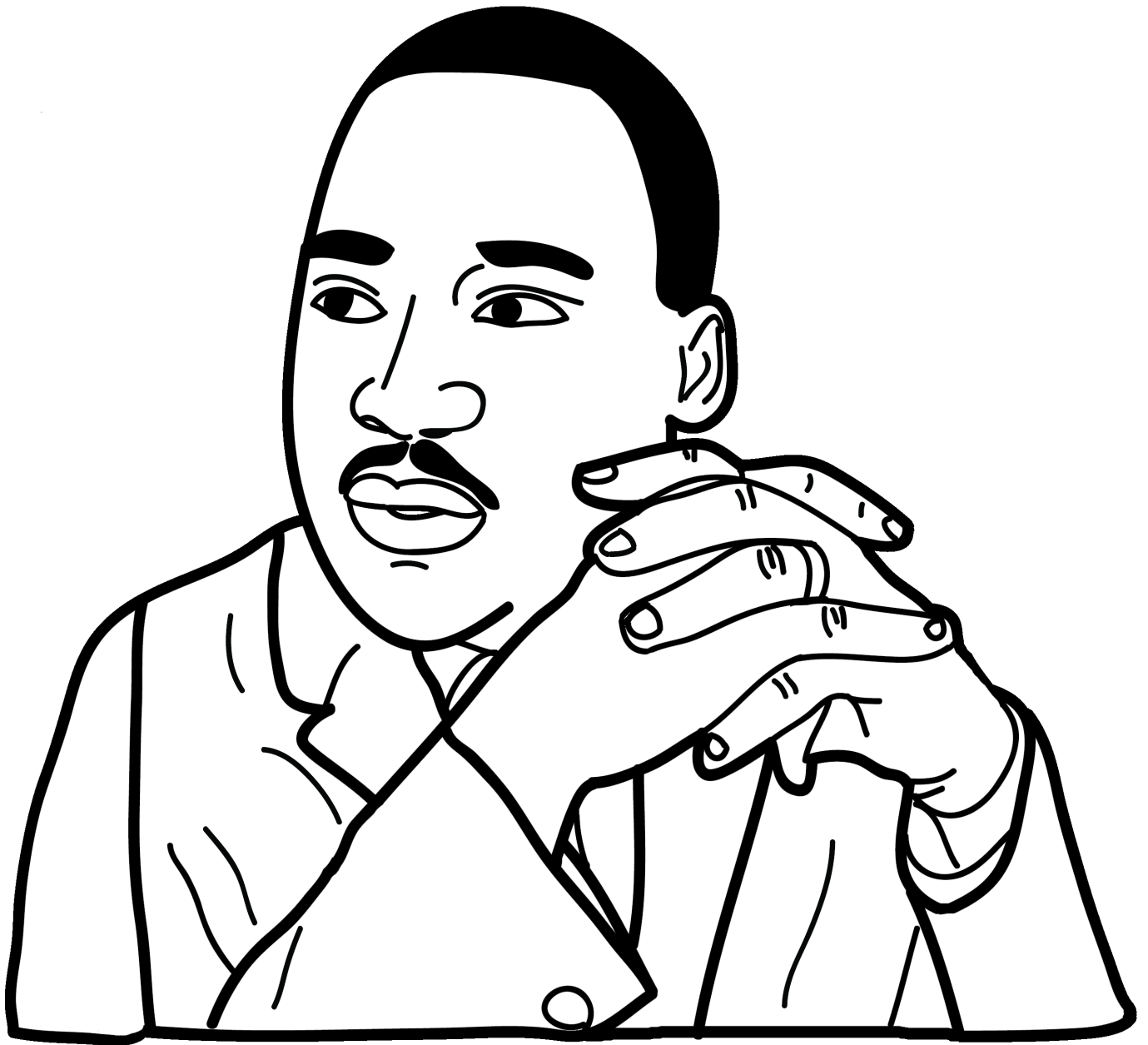
Martin Luther King,

speaker.



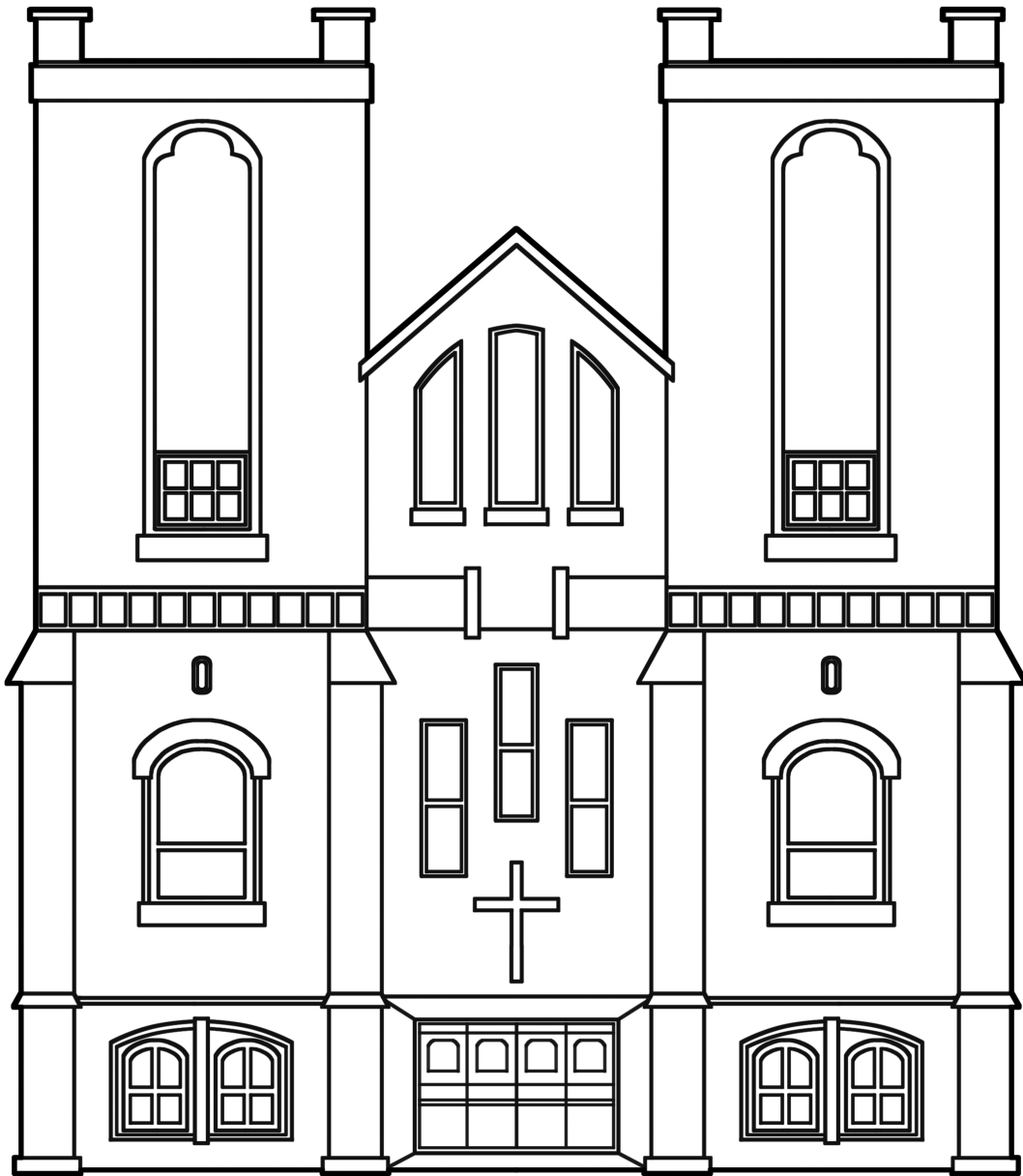
He did not believe

peaceful protests.



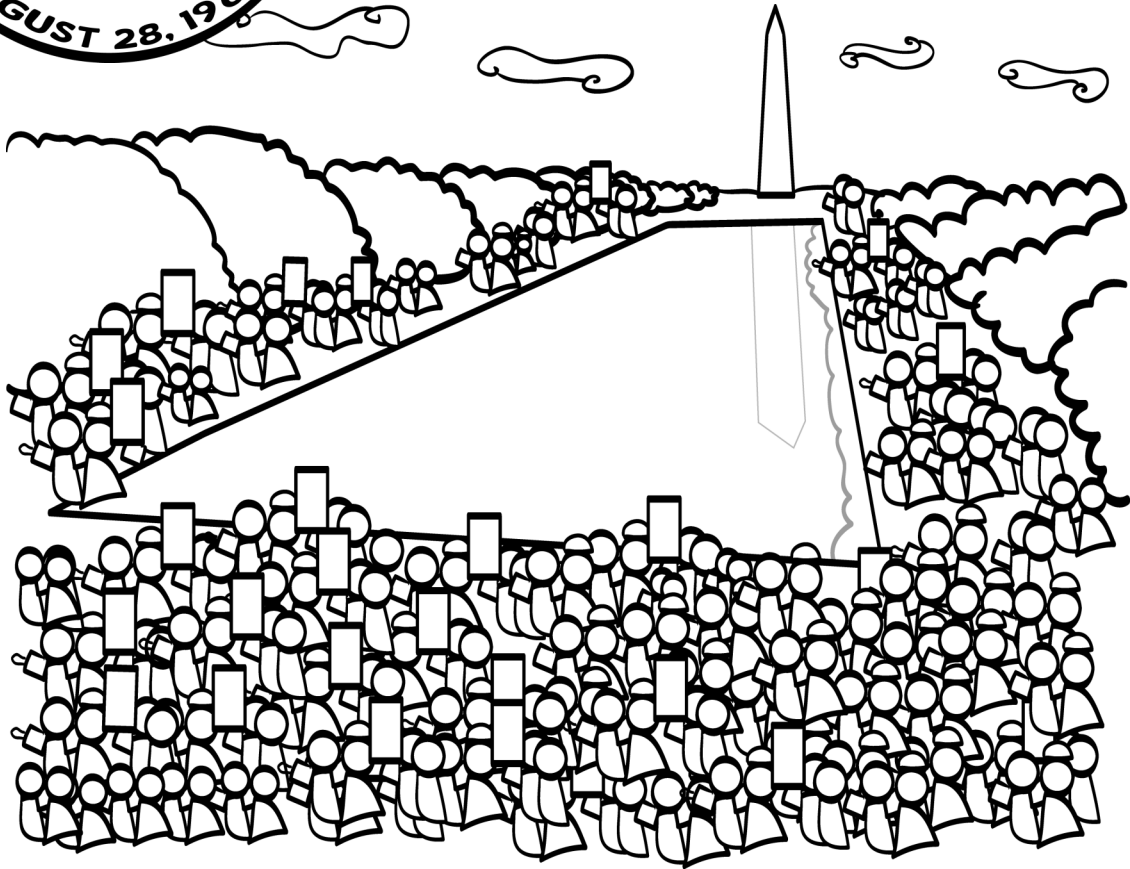
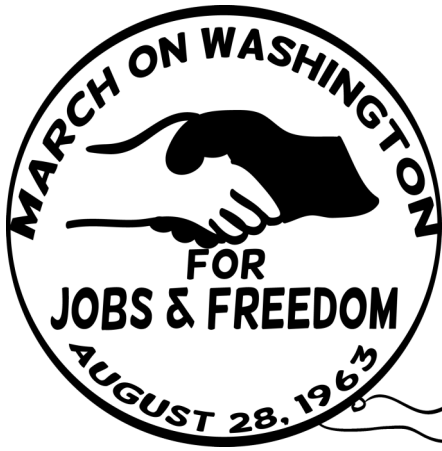
He co-founded the

his father.

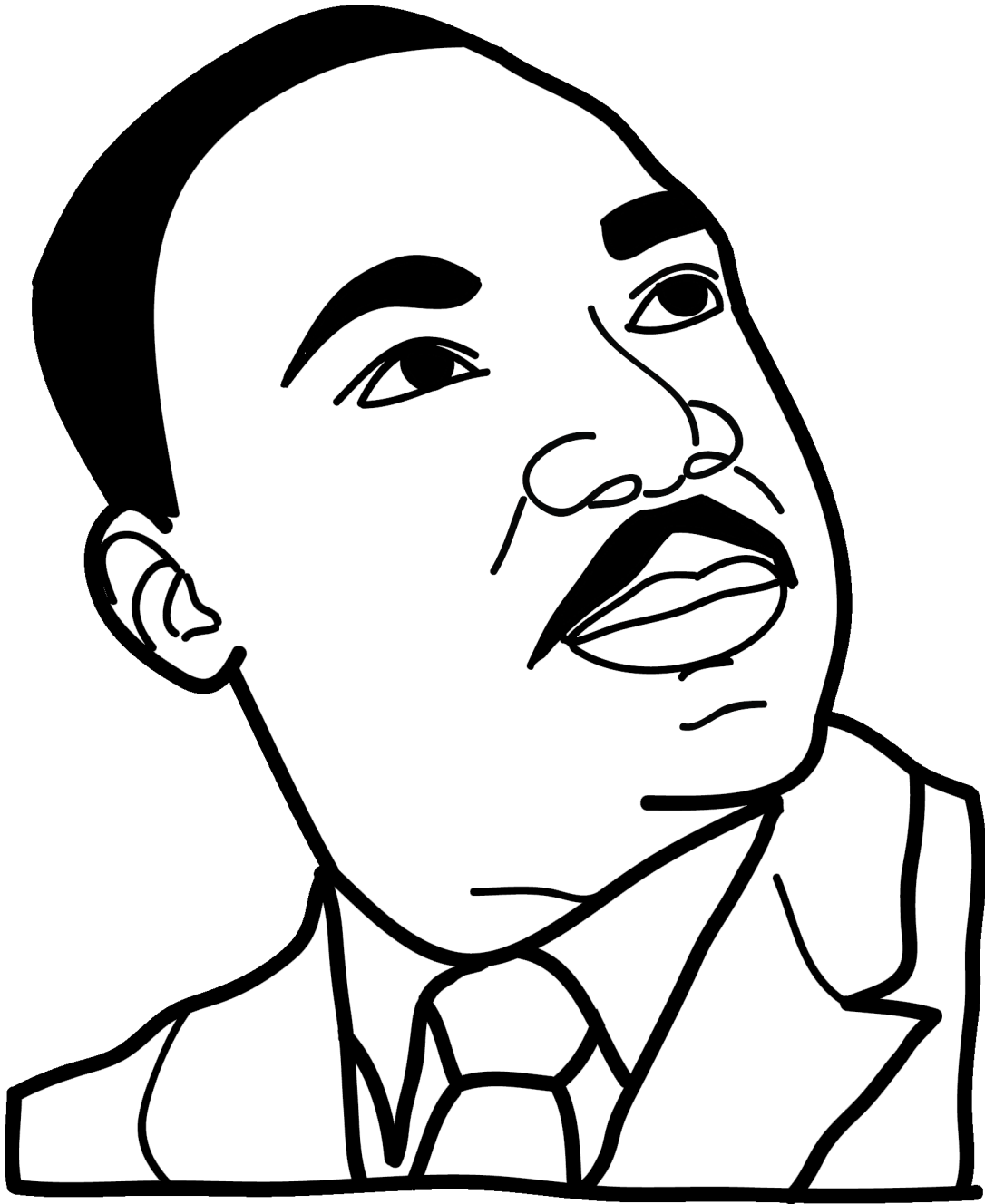


At the March on

he made his "I have

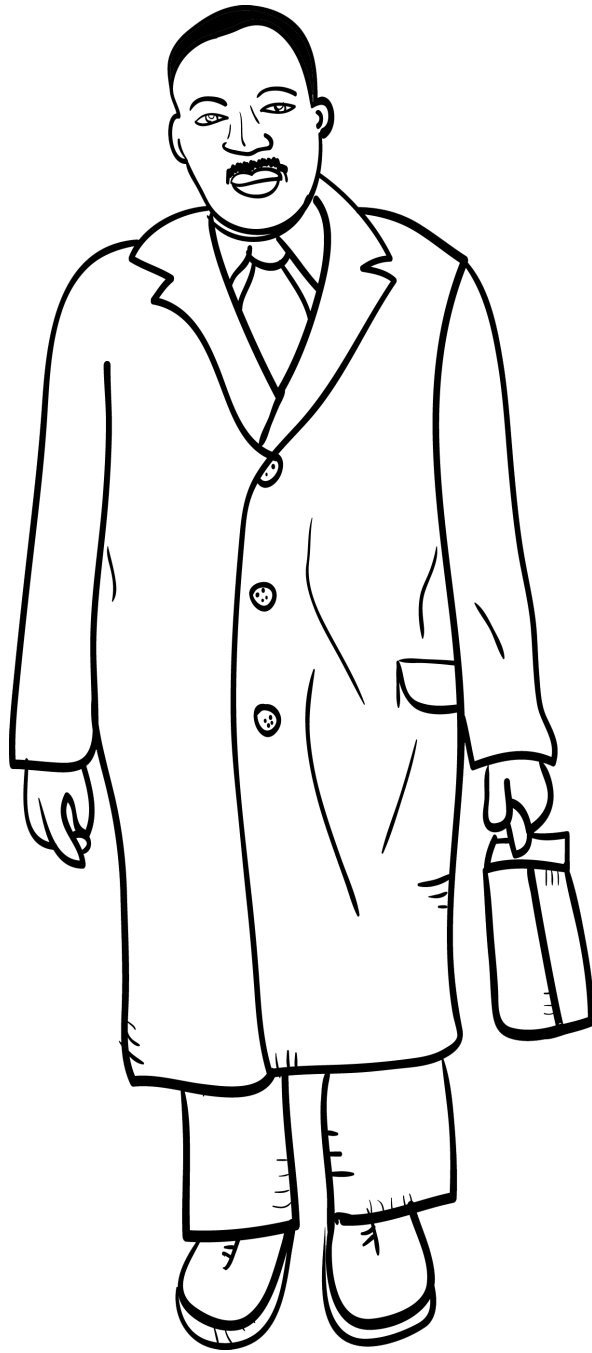
a Dream" speech.

Peace Prize in 1964.



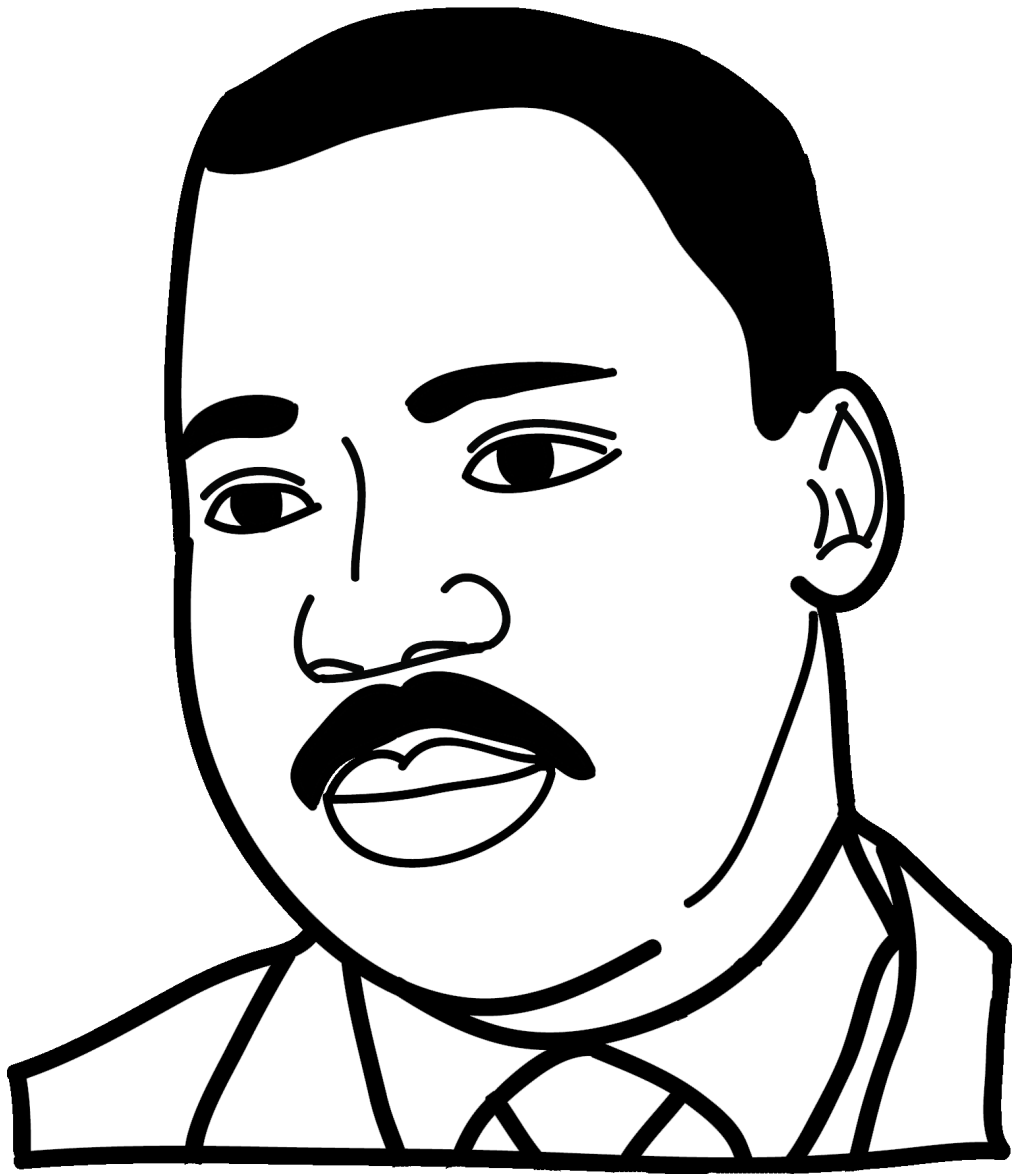
The peaceful

of 1965 passed.



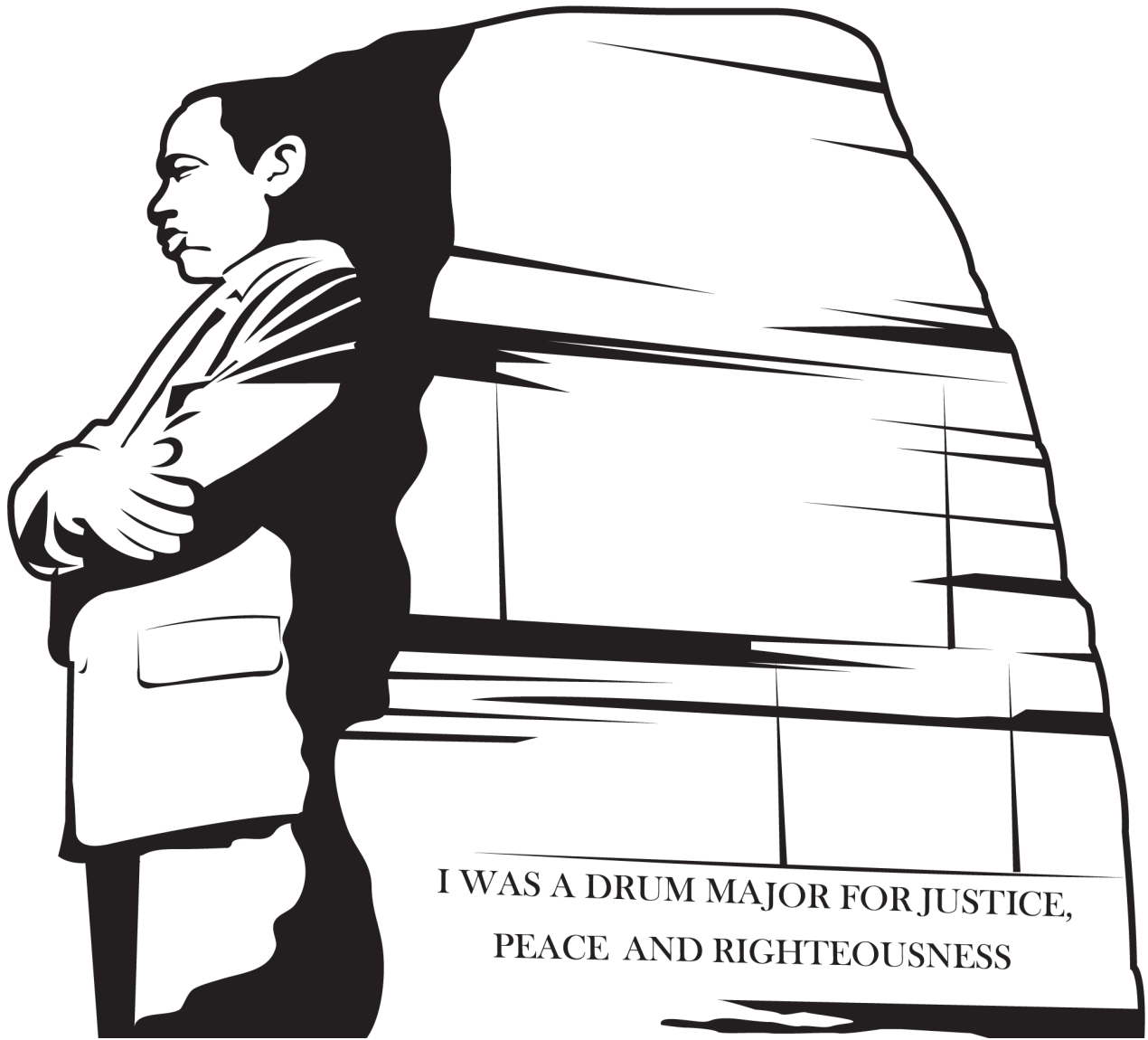
He went to
