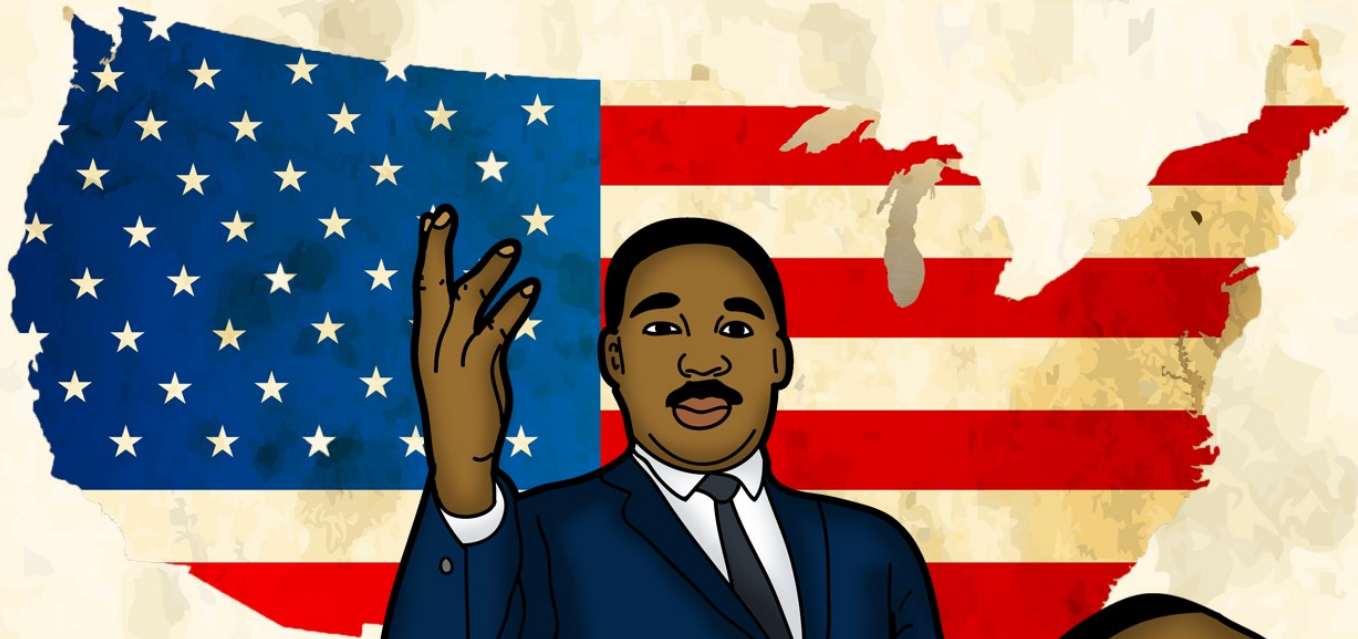

Atlanta, Georgia, on

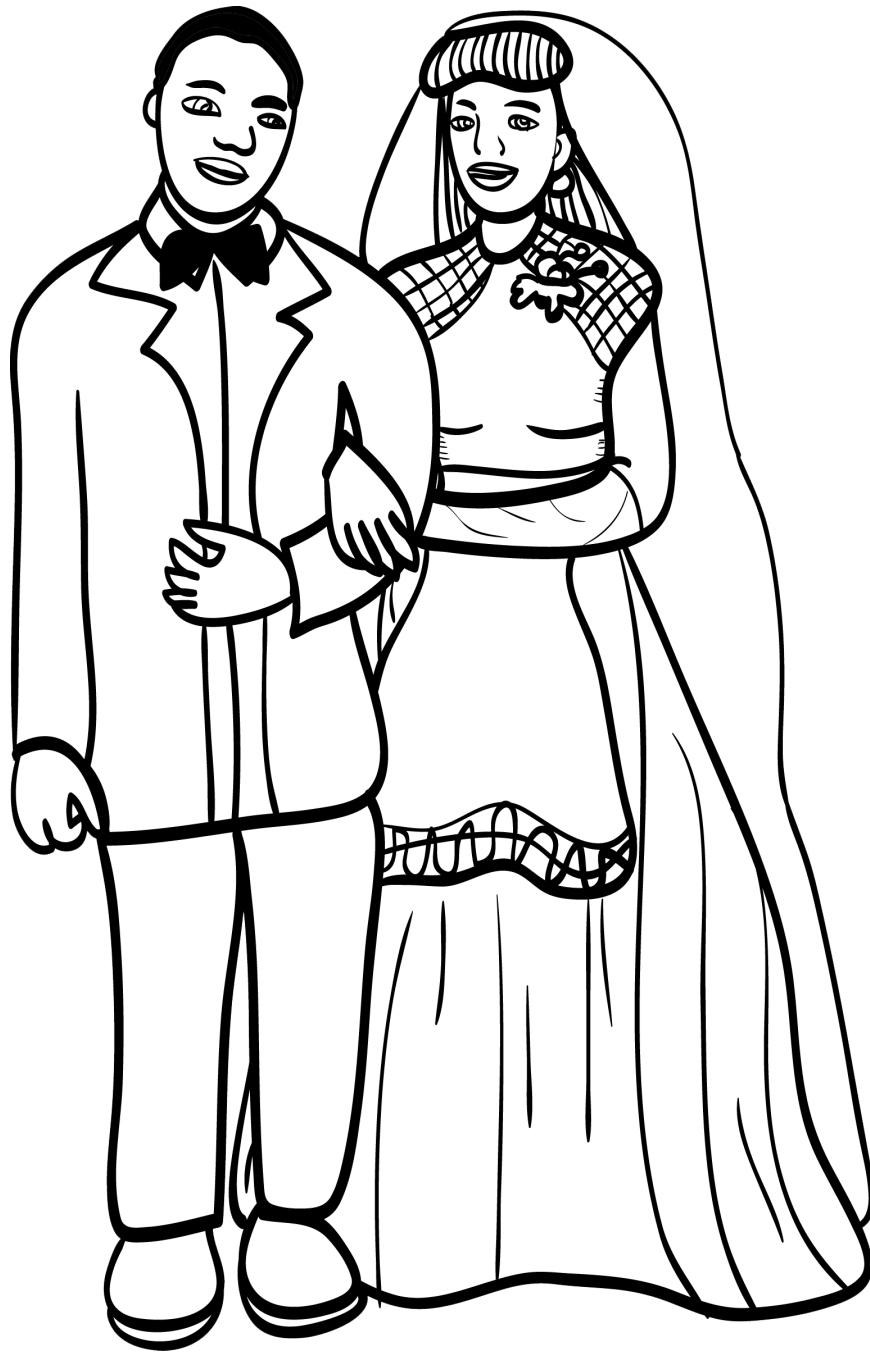
January 15, 1929.

a Baptist minister.



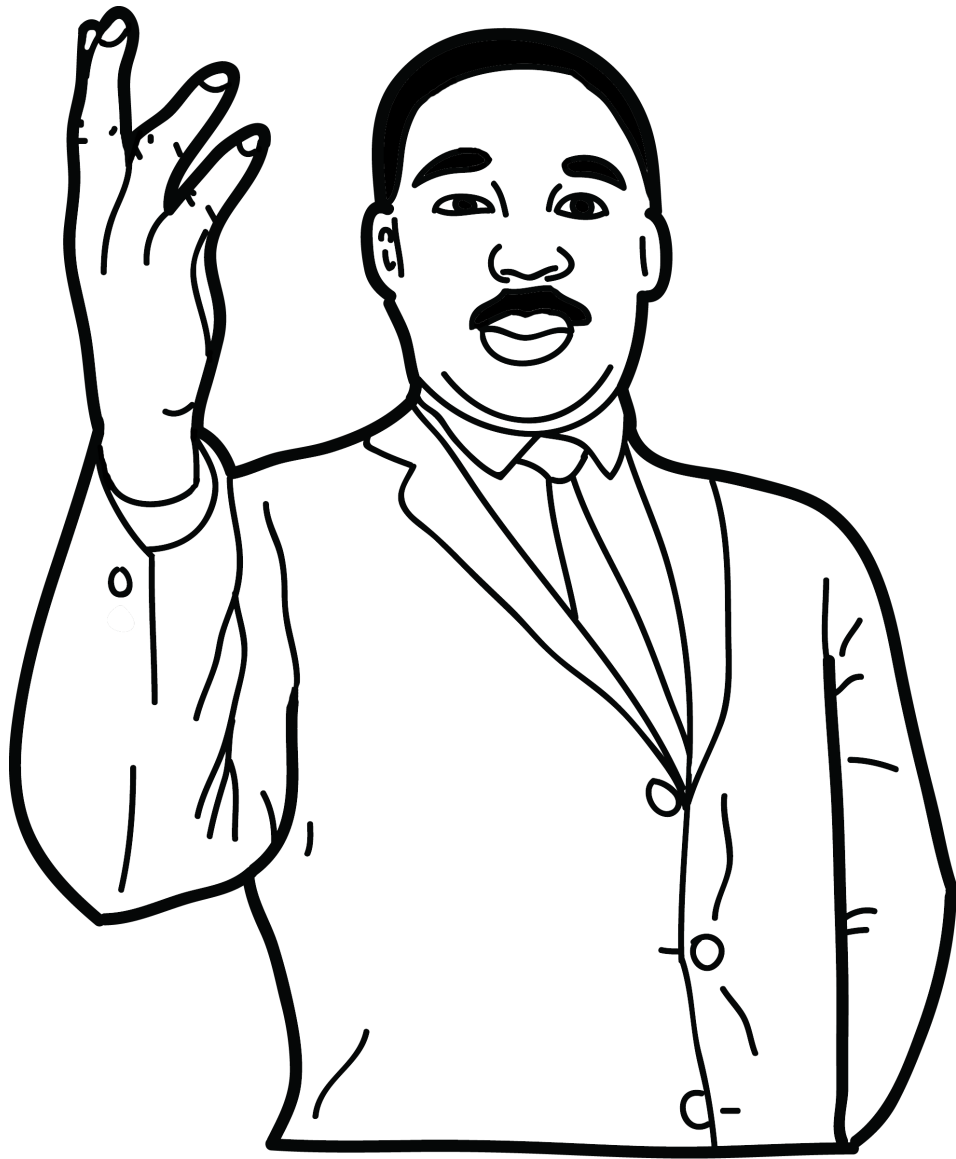
He attended Morehouse

Scott in Boston, and

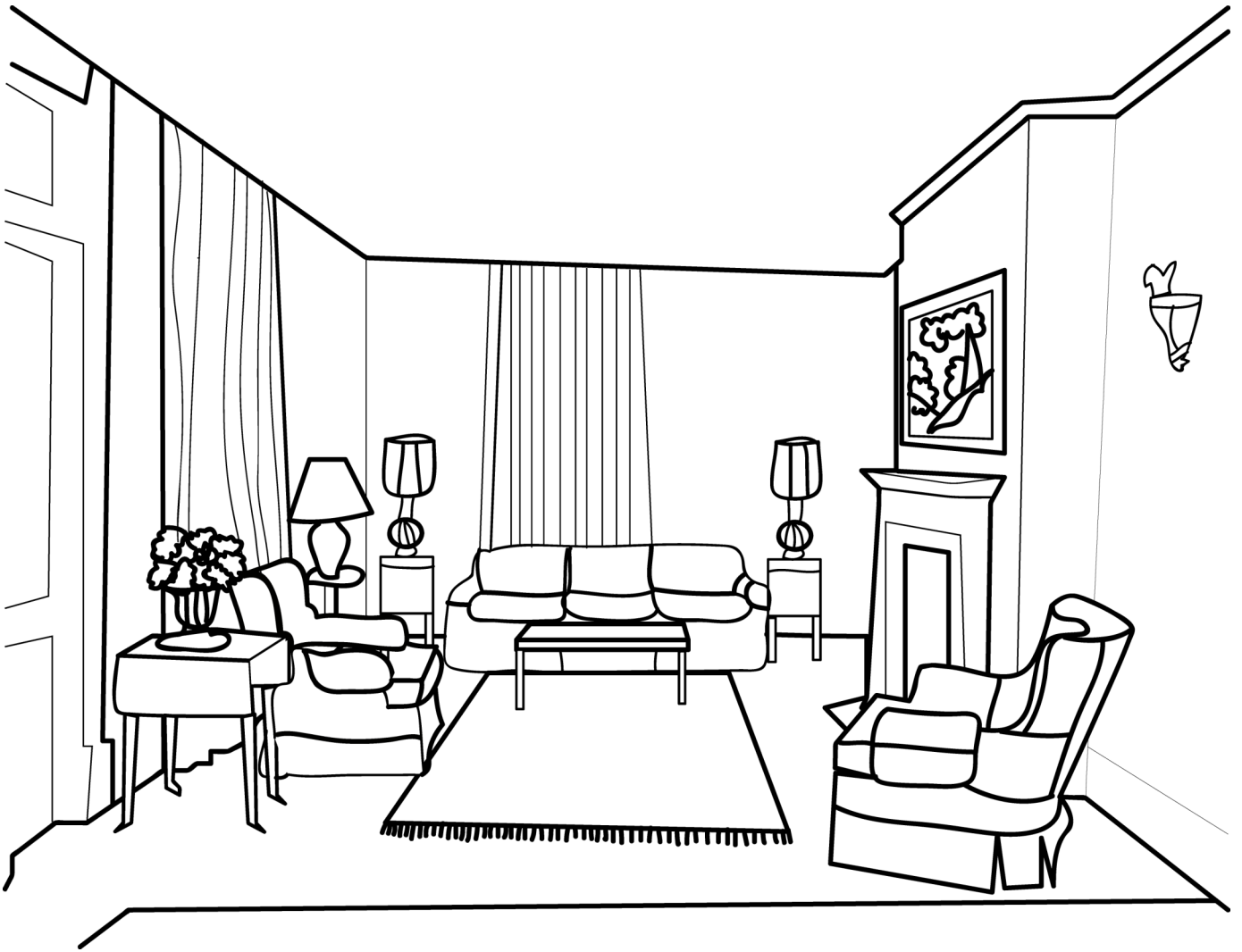
they later married.

belonged to the church.



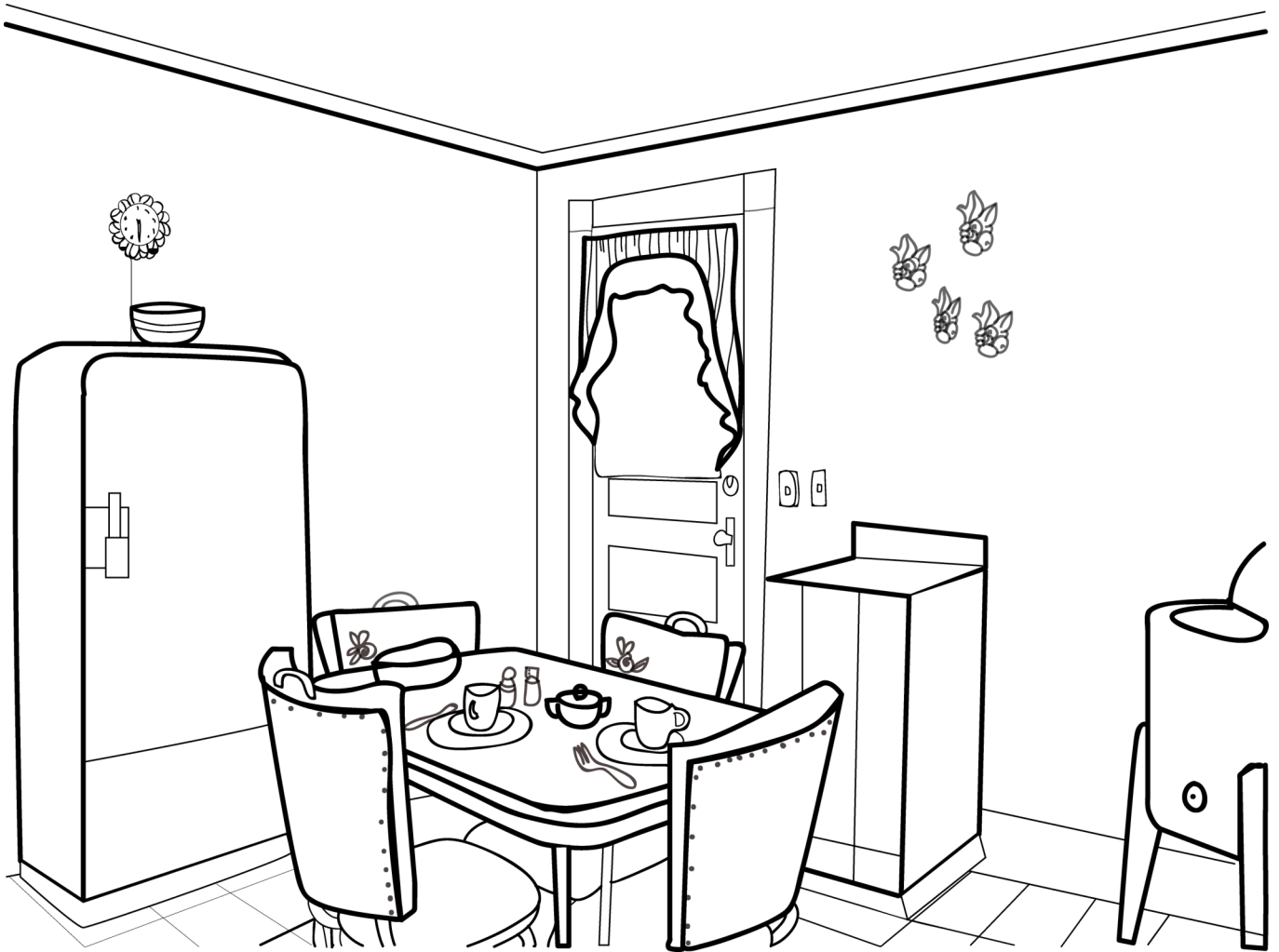
There was a

and a bedroom.



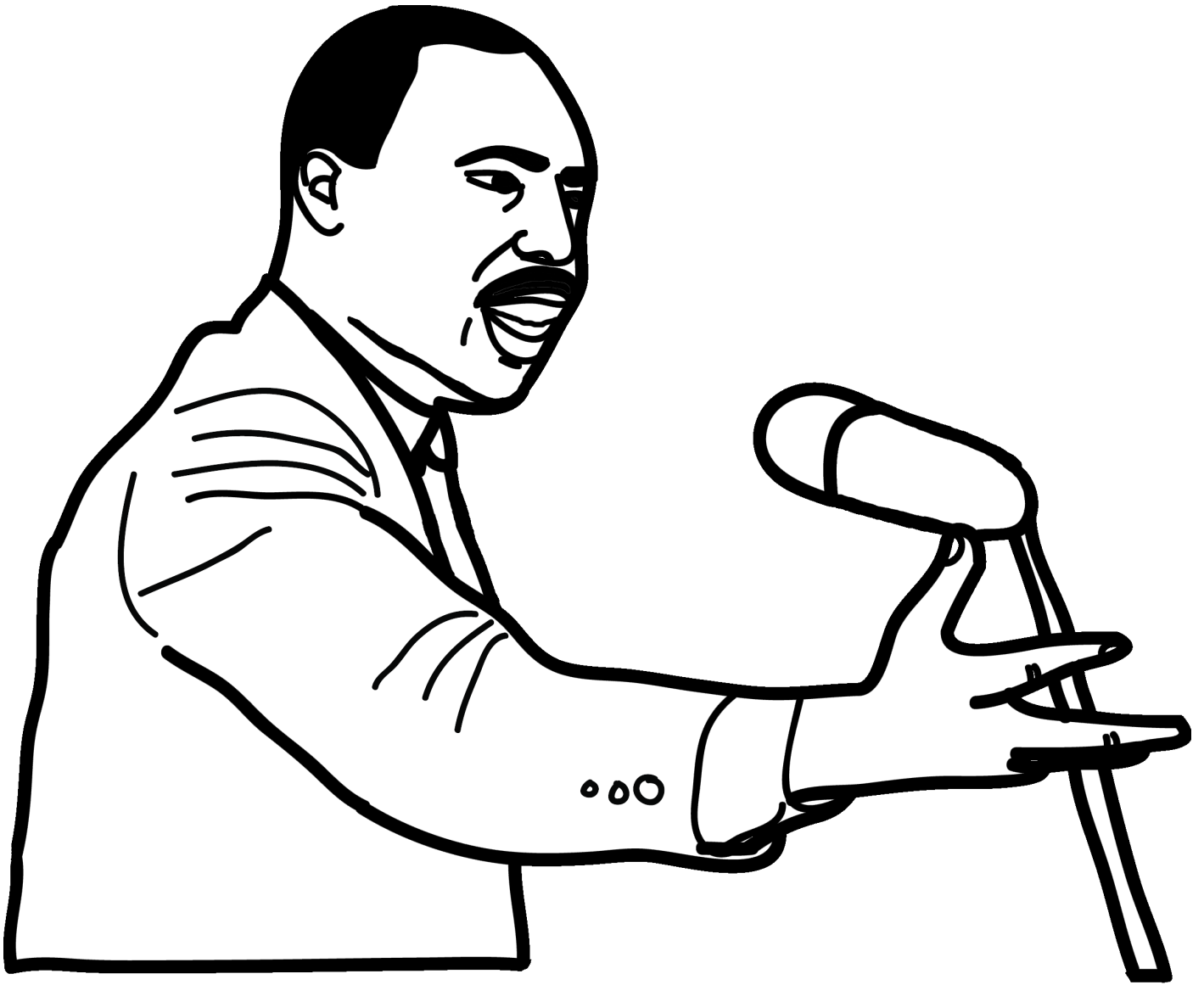
Martin Luther

King, Jr. was a

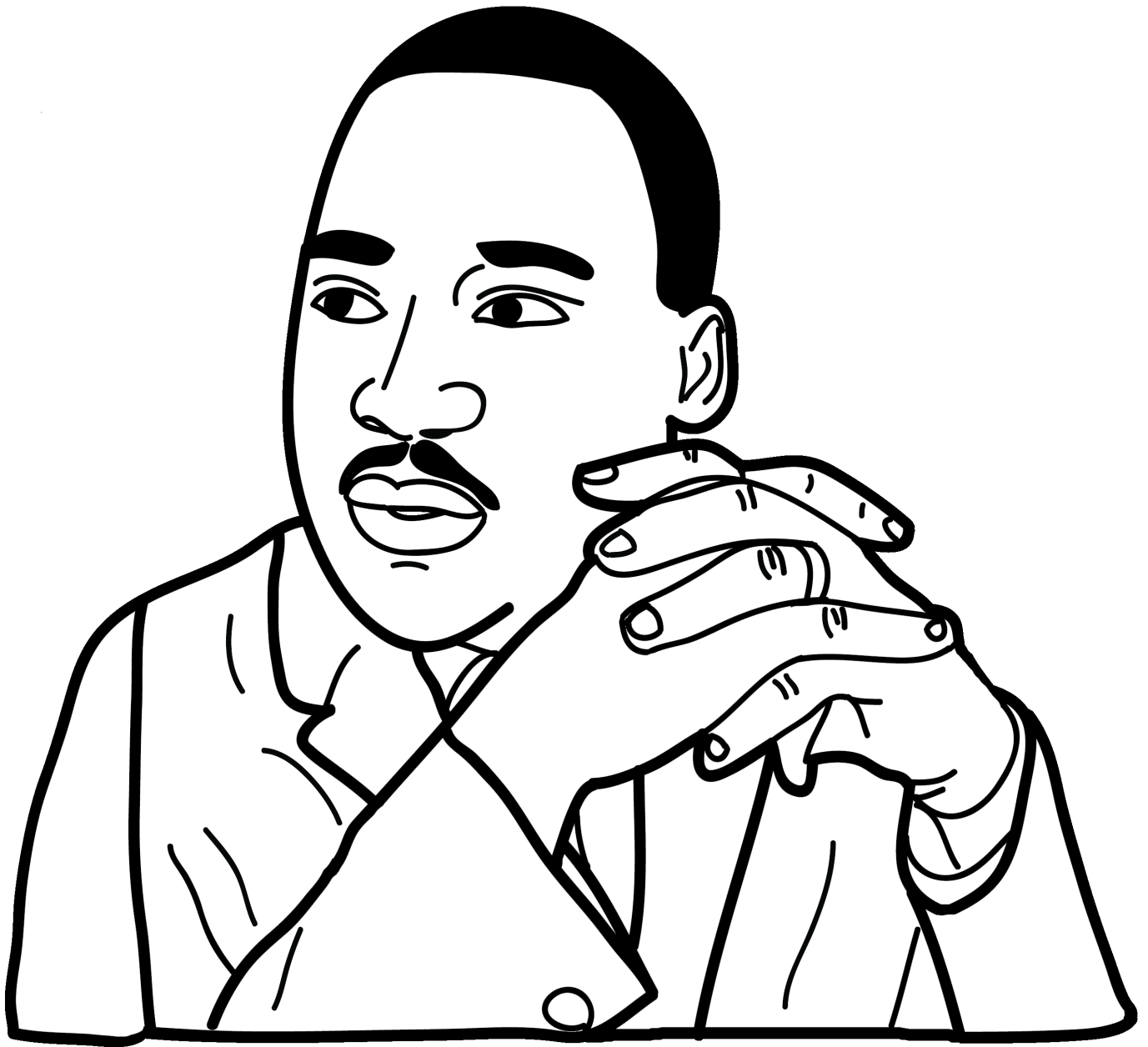
powerful speaker.



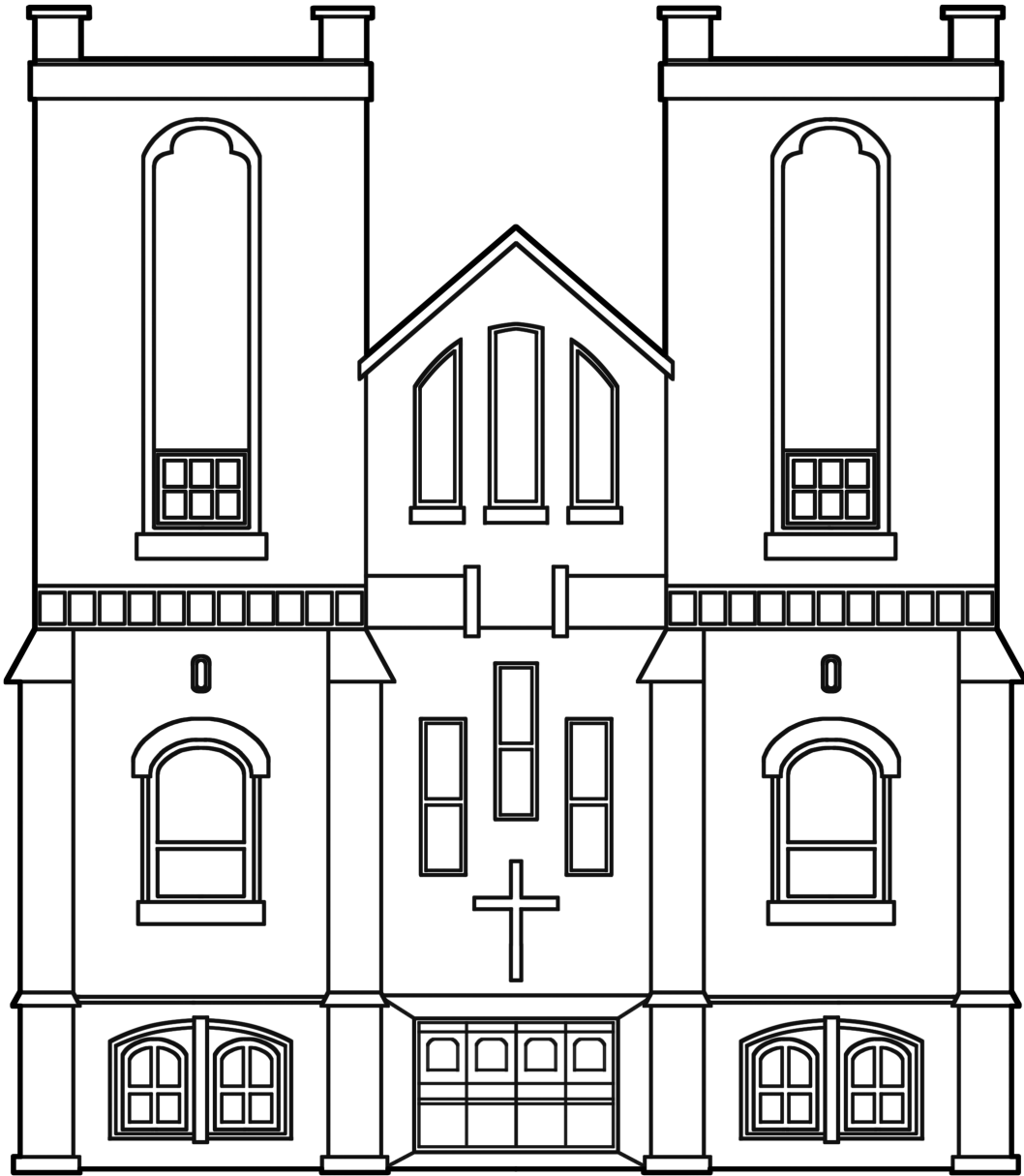
He did not believe in

in peaceful protests.



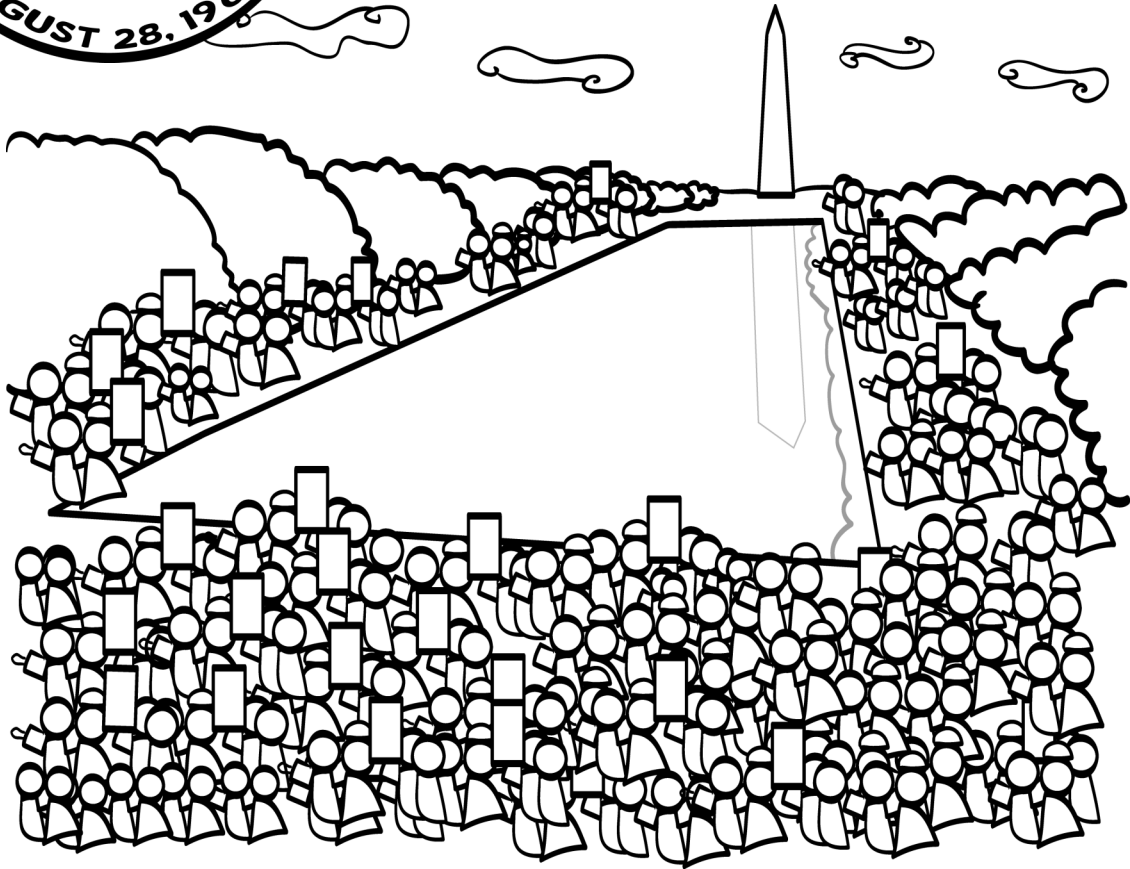
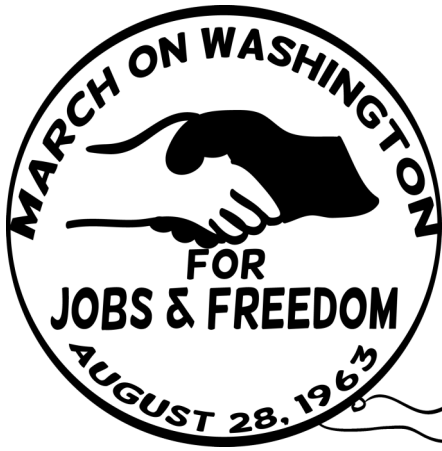
He co-founded the

to fight racism.



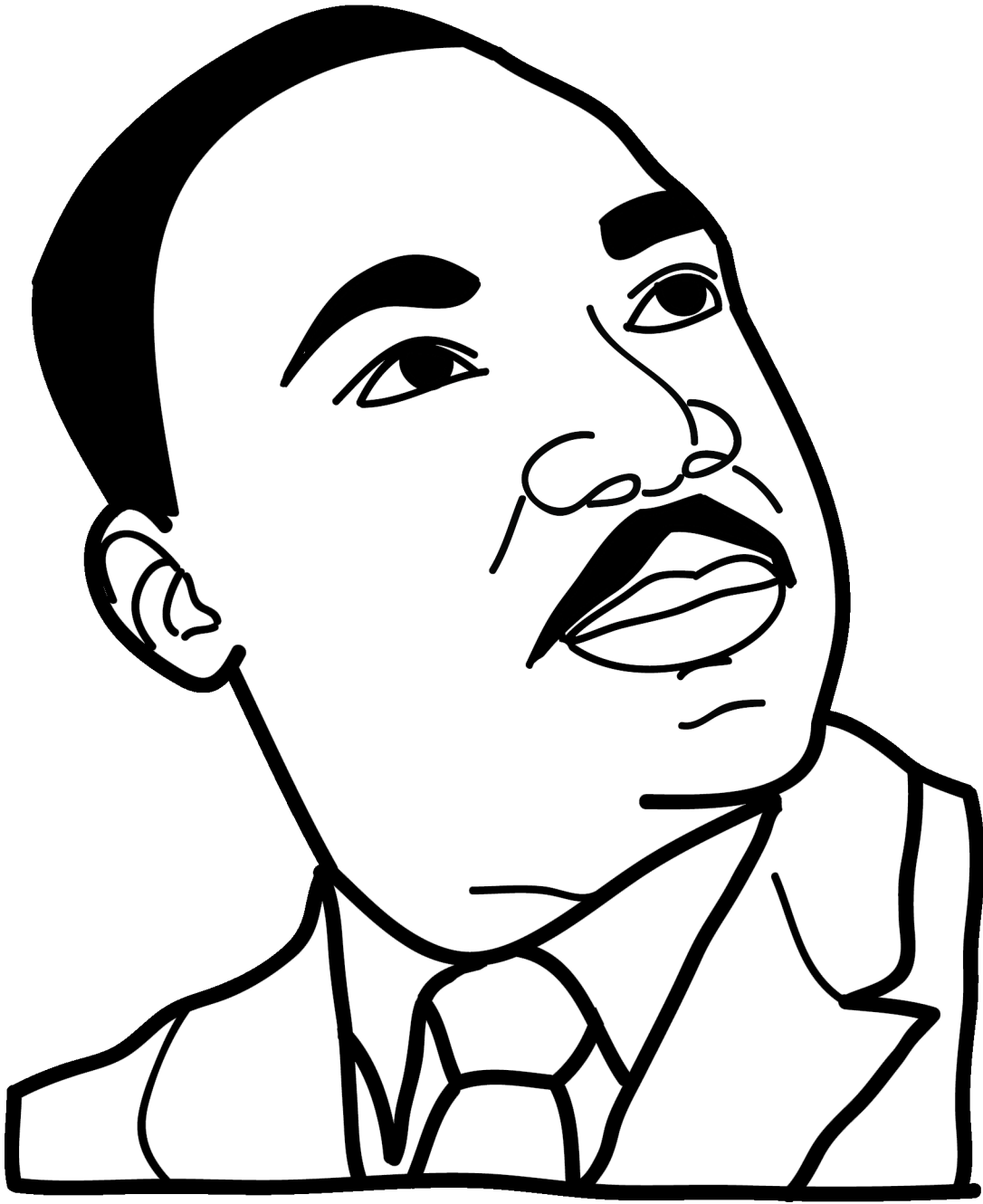
He moved his family

a Dream" speech.

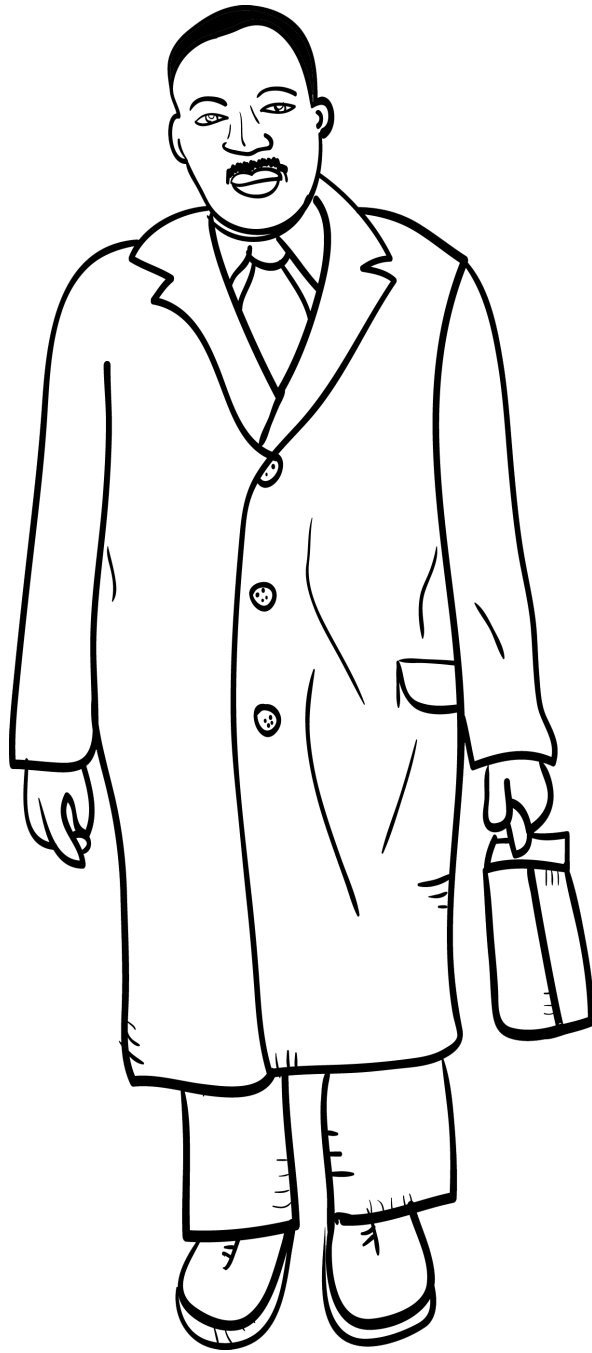


He won the Nobel

Peace Prize in 1964.



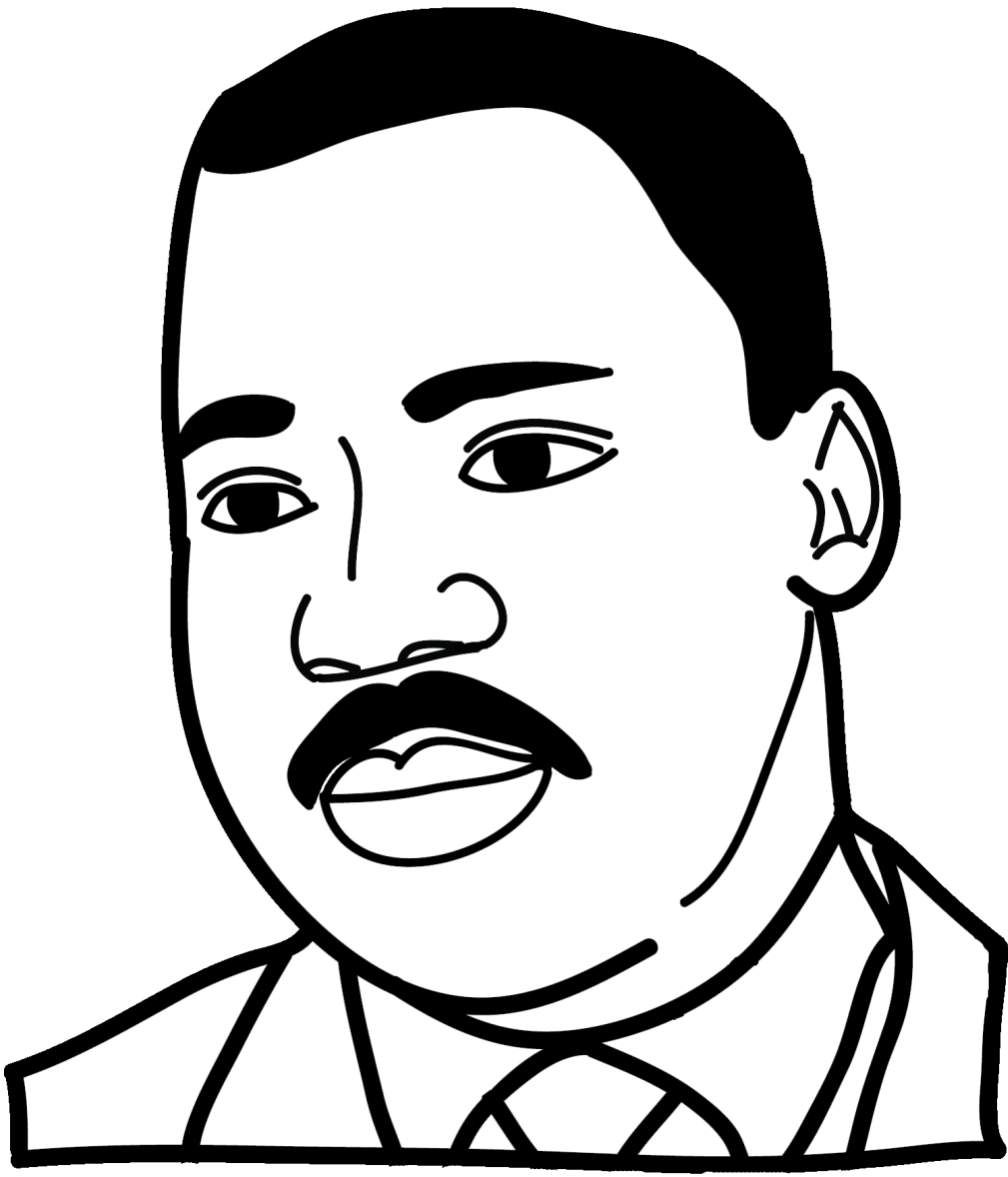
The peaceful protests

of 1965 passed.



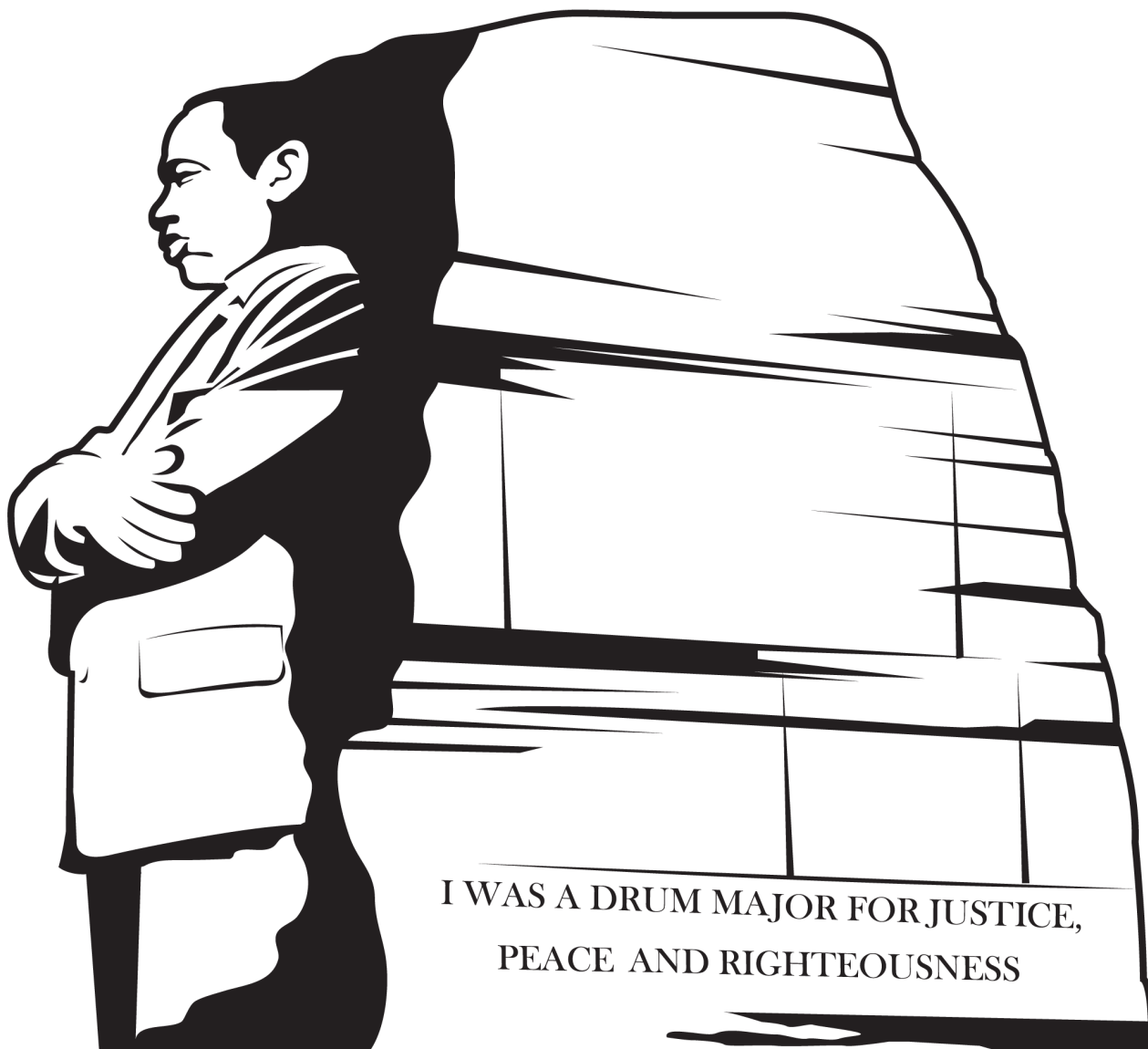
He went to
