



The rain is raining all around, It falls on field and tree, It rains on the umbrellas here,






Activities

- 1. Take two Styrofoam balls (one each of two different but similar sizes) and glue cotton balls to each until they are both completely covered. Once they are dry, glue the two cotton-covered balls together and let them dry. It may work best if you put a toothpick into the balls to help hold them together, and you will not have to hold them while the glue dries the second time. Decorate your snowman with eyes, nose, and mouth made from material scraps or construction paper. You can even put a scrap of material or ribbon around the snowman's neck for a scarf. Use your imagination.
- 2. Help your child make snowflakes out of construction paper. Fold a piece of paper in half. Fold it in half again. Now, fold it in half one more time. Using a pair of scissors, cut little pieces out of the folds—they can be any shape. You can even cut little pieces out of the edges. When your child has cut out as many little pieces as she wants, open the paper up. She can do this over and over, making different snowflakes by cutting different shapes in the folds and edges.
- 3. A quick Internet search will turn up all types of recipes to help you make snow for a sensory bin. Many use only 2 ingredients such as baking soda and either shaving cream or hair conditioner and are very easy to make. Some are even able to be kept for periods of time so they can be used again and again. With a snow sensory bin, you can do this poem whether you have snow where you live or not and still have some of the fun of "playing in the snow." You can also buy instant snow in the stores that you simply add water to in order to make snow to play with.
- 4. Another recipe you may find on your Internet search is how to make snow paint. This "paint" dries fluffy and spongy so it is something that will make a fun and unique painting. Just be sure to use different colors of construction paper to paint on so it shows up.


Notes/Ideas:






Can you help me find my shadow?


