

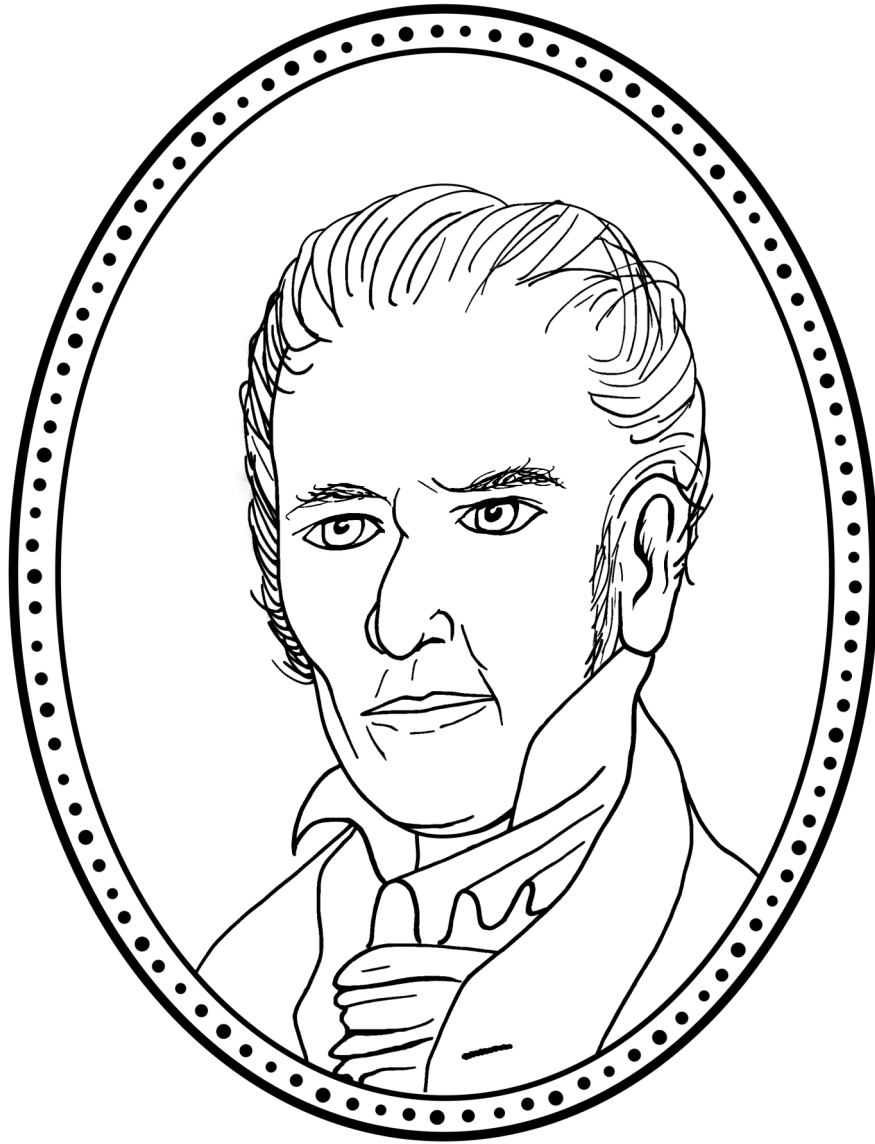
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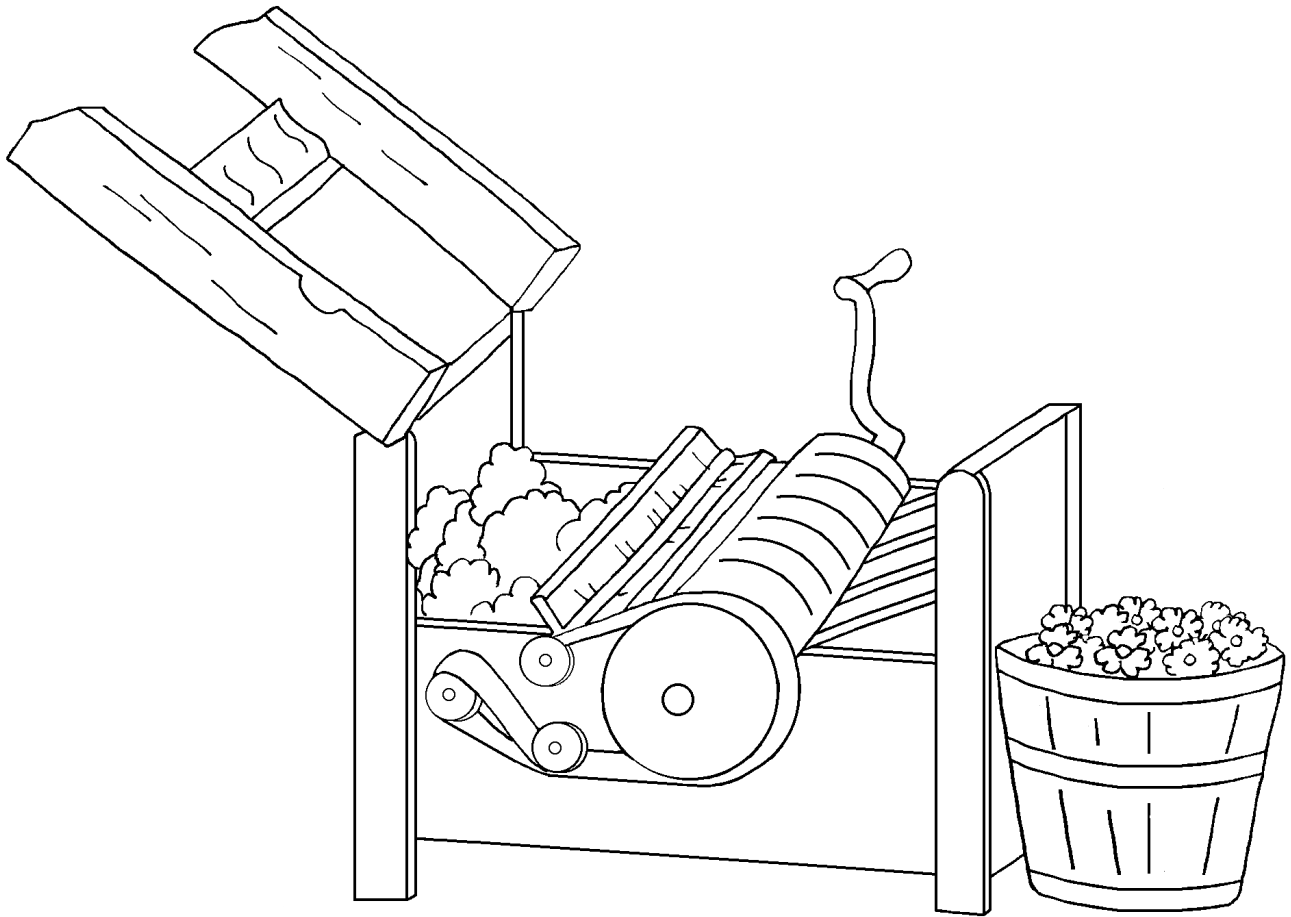
Eli Whitney was

born on

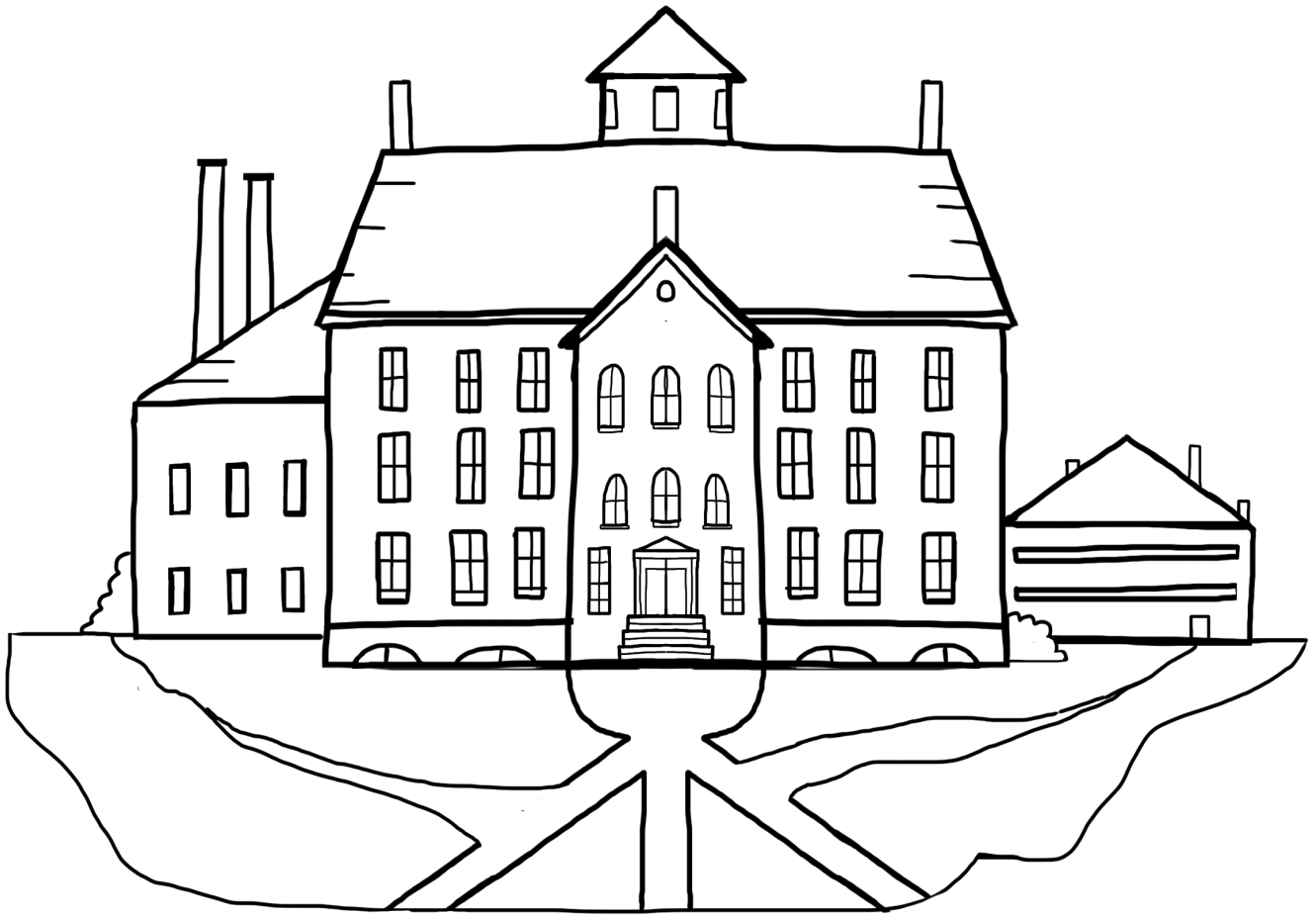
December 8, 1765,
