

Instructions

Preparing the Game:

Print and cut out the cards you wish to use. A set of cards in color and a set of black and white cards are both included. Students can color the black and white set to make their own set of cards if they wish. There are 15 sets of cards and 7 farmer cards (wild cards). The cards will last longer if they are printed on cardstock and laminated, but they can be used just as easily if they are printed on copy paper and laminated or just printed on paper. Cut the cards apart on the lines. You can use all 15 sets of cards to play or choose to use fewer sets if you want a shorter game. There is also a blank page included that you or your students can use to create your own additional sets if you wish.

Playing the Game:

Shuffle or mix the cards together well that are being used. Put the cards in a pile in the center of the table. Each player, starting with the youngest and moving clockwise, draws a card from the pile until each player has four cards. This is the starting hand for each player. The object of the game is to get as many sets of cards as possible. Each set has six cards that show what happens to a common food or drink in sequence. Each card has a number 1-6 to show where it falls in the sequence and the name of the set it belongs to such as applesauce, eggs, etc. After the players have drawn their cards, they organize them in their hand without showing them to anyone. For example, if a player has the following cards: "2 Applesauce," "1 Milk," "3 Eggs," and "3 Applesauce," they should put the two applesauce cards side by side in their hand to see what they still need to make a set of applesauce cards.

The first player draws two cards from the pile of cards in the center of the table. They decide if these cards will help them make a set of cards. The player takes one card from their hand (either one they already had or one of the cards they have just drawn) and mixes it back into the pile of cards on the table. Whenever a player has a full set of six cards, they should play the set instead of discarding one. Play continues until all the cards have been drawn. After the final card is drawn, anyone holding a complete set that has not been played (such as one that can be made complete with a wild card), should play the set. The player with the most complete sets at the end of the game wins.

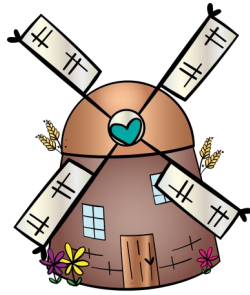
Using the Wild Card:

The farmer cards are wild cards. Each farmer card can replace one, and only one, of the cards in a set. For example, if someone has five of the applesauce cards and draws a farmer card, they can use this to replace the one card in the set they are missing. A player can use as many wild cards as they like, but they can only use one wild card per set.

Wheat is harvested from the field.



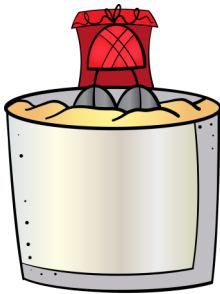
2 Bread

Flour can be made from ground wheat and mixed with other things.



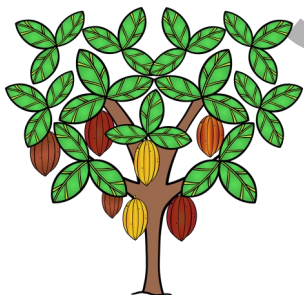
5 Bread

One thing that can be made with flour is warm, delicious bread.



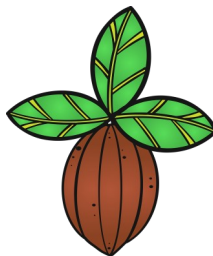
6 Bread

Did you know chocolate comes from trees called cacao trees?



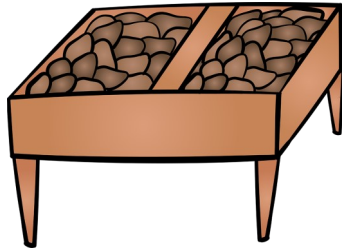
2 Chocolate

Pods full of cacao beans grow on the trees.



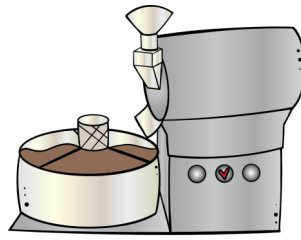
3 Chocolate

The cacao beans need to be dried.



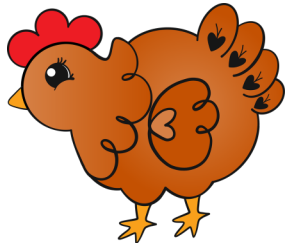
5 Chocolate

After they are dried, cacao beans are made ready to use.



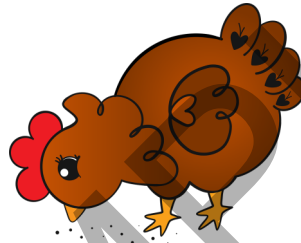
6 Chocolate

Chickens eat grain and other foods.



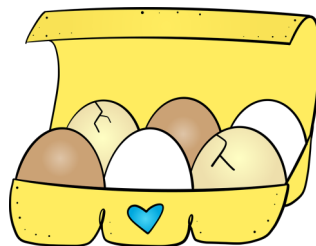
3 Eggs

On small farms, chicken eggs must be gathered to be used or sold.



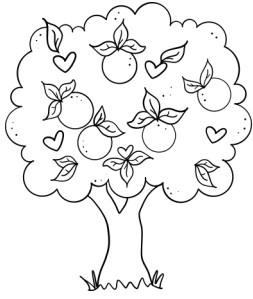
5 Eggs

Sometimes, you can buy the eggs right from the farm.



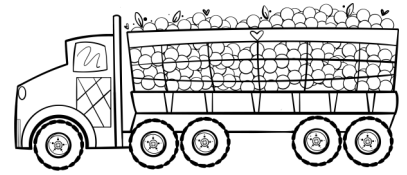
1 Orange Juice

Oranges grow on trees.



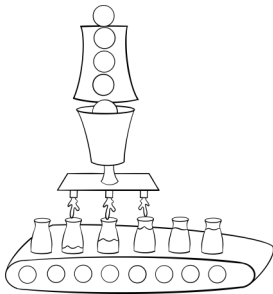
2 Orange Juice

When they are ripe, the oranges are picked.



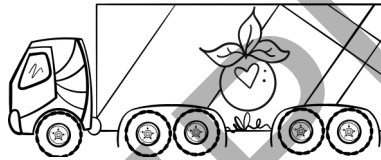
3 Orange Juice

Big trucks carry lots of oranges to places that make orange juice.



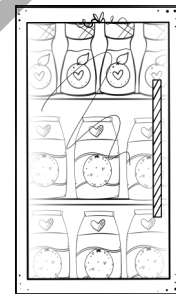
4 Orange Juice

The oranges are put through machines to bottle the orange juice.



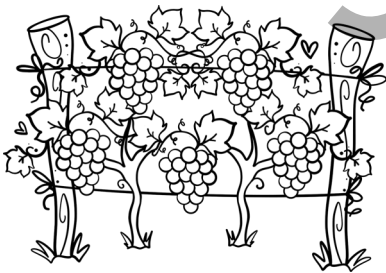
5 Orange Juice

Big trucks carry the bottles of orange juice to stores.



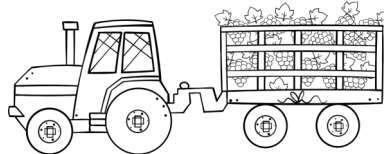
6 Orange Juice

The orange juice is put in cases to stay cold until someone buys it.



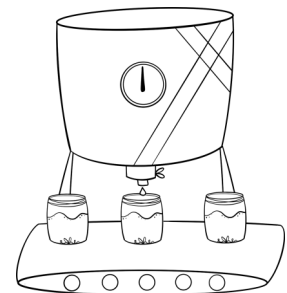
1 Grape Jam

Grapes grow on vines.



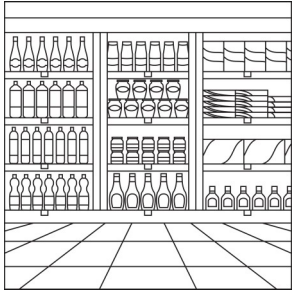
2 Grape Jam

The jars of grape jam are taken to the stores.



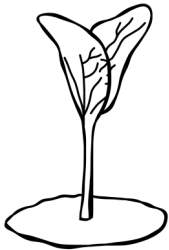
5 Grape Jam

You can buy grape jam to take home and eat.



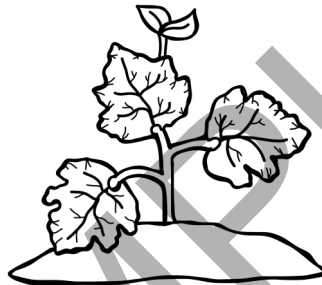
6 Grape Jam

At first, a pumpkin plant is small.



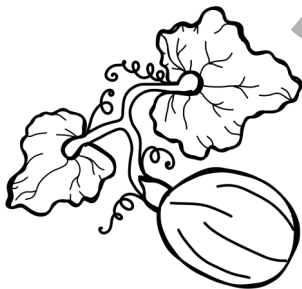
2 Pumpkin

The plant grows into a vine and grows flowers.



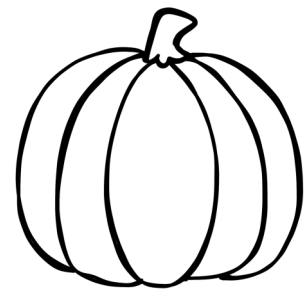
4 Pumpkin
