Instructions

Preparing the Game:

Print and cut out the cards you wish to use. There are 66 sets of cards. The cards will last longer if they are printed on cardstock and laminated, but they can be used just as easily if they are printed on copy paper and laminated or just printed on paper. Cut the cards apart on the lines. You can use all 66 sets of cards to play or choose to use fewer sets if you want a shorter game, such as just the Old Testament or just the New Testament. There is a blank page included that you or your students can use to create your own additional sets if you wish.


Playing the Game:


Shuffle or mix the cards together well that are being used. Put the cards in a pile in the center of the table. Each player, starting with the youngest and moving clockwise, draws a card from the pile until each player has four cards. This is the starting hand for each player. The object of the game is to get as many sets of cards as possible. Each set has four cards that have part of a Bible verse on them. Each card also has the verse reference, the abbreviation of the name of the book of the Bible in the upper left corner, and a number that shows what part of the verse the card includes on the bottom of the card. After the players have drawn their cards, they organize them in their hand without showing them to anyone. For example, if a player has a card with part of a verse from Genesis, a card with part of a verse from John, and two cards with parts of a verse from Matthew, they should put the "Matthew" cards side by side in their hand to see what they still need to make a set of "Matthew" cards.


The first player draws two cards from the pile of cards in the center of the table. They decide if these cards will help them make a set of cards. The player takes one card from their hand (either one they already had or one of the cards they have just drawn) and mixes it back into the pile of cards on the table. Whenever a player has a full set of four cards (four parts of the same verse), they should play the set instead of discarding a card. Play continues until all the cards have been drawn. After the final card is drawn, anyone holding a complete set that has not been played (such as one that the player may have forgotten to play on their turn), they should play the set. The player with the most complete sets at the end of the game wins.


A Fun Twist:


As students learn the verses used in the game, play the game with one card missing from each verse. When a student has a set of three cards from the same verse, they can play it if they can recite the full verse when they play the set. You may want to decide before playing how much the other players can help the student remember the missing piece so they can play a set of cards. A list of the complete verses used in the game is included in the back of the book.
