

Lincoln Fact:

Abraham Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809, in Kentucky. His family moved to southwestern Indiana in 1816. After his mother's death, his father remarried. Abraham missed his mother terribly, but he grew to love his stepmother a great deal. Although his parents attended church, Abraham never joined any particular church. Many feel this was because of the terrible rivalry between denominations that he witnessed at times. However, he knew the Bible thoroughly and had deep religious beliefs.
